BONAR LAW SAYS NO ALLIED ARRANGEMENT TO ATTACK PETROGRAD

London, May 13—(Reuters)—In the House of Commons today Commander Wedgwood asked regarding a report that the Entente were preparing to attack Petrograd in co-operation with Finland. Bonar Law replied that a British squadron was available at Helsingfors in case of emergency, but no such arrangement as suggested had been made. Obviously, if anything of the sort were contemplated it would be impossible to say anything in regard to it. (Cheers.) Mr. Law declined, amid cheers, to give any undertaking that the government would not be committed to attack Petrograd in co-operation with Finland without the commons being acquired.

BIG LOSS IN MARCH IN OPERATION OF THE AMERICAN RAILROADS

Washington, May 14—Railroad earnings for March as tabulated by the railroad administration show a net income of \$14,995,000 for the federally controlled roads in March, although the monthly compensation amounts to approximately \$74,047,000, making the net loss to the government about \$59,052,000. Figures recently made public based on statistics gathered by the interstate commerce commission covering the federal controlled roads and a small mileage of non-federal lines, gave the net income for March \$10,842,000.

CLOUDS TO PHOTOGRAPH

ECLIPSE OF THE SUN

New York, May 14—Professor David Todd, who has charge of the Amherst College astronomical observatory, said yesterday for Monte Video to take observations of a solar eclipse on May 29. He will view it from a naval seaplane at an altitude of from 10,000 to 15,000 feet. This is an innovation in astronomy. He says it should result in the obtaining of clearer photographs of an eclipse than ever have been made before, as the plane would soar well above interfering clouds.

VIOLENCE IF THEY SIGN THE TREATY

Threats Are Received by the Chinese Delegation in Paris

Paris, May 14—(By the Associated Press)—Messages threatening violence if they sign the peace treaty have been received by the Chinese delegation from various parts of China. A despatch sent by 35,000 citizens of Shantung province, May 11, says:

"Regarding the Tsing Tau problem Japan shows contempt for public right. The people of Shantung refuse to accept as effective such illegal demands. The traitors to our country, Tsao Yu-lin (minister of communications, whose house was burned at Peking) and Chang Tsung-Hsiang (former minister to Japan, who was severely beaten by the Chinese) deserved death for the blow suffered by the Chinese people."

"Should you sign the Japanese proposal you must receive the same treatment upon returning to China. We cannot give ear to apologies. Do not fail us. We are much in earnest."

NO RECOGNITION OF IRISH-AMERICANS

Lloyd George Will Not Receive Them and Colonel House Will Not Assist

London, May 14—It was learned last night in official quarters that Frank P. Walsh, Edward Dunne and Michael P. Ryan, representatives of Irish societies in the United States, who have been visiting Ireland, will not be received by Premier Lloyd George on their return to Paris
