**TO COMMEMORATE
SERVICE HELD HERE
CENTURY AND HALF AGO**
First Religious Service in English in St. John District
Site Identified as Area Owned
Partly by J. S. Gregory and
Partly by Maritime Nail Works

A century and a half ago the first religious service conducted in English in the district where St. John now stands—and for that matter the first in what now is the province of New Brunswick—was held in the open air at Port-Hall. The date was July 2, 1768, and now, 180 years later, the event is to be commemorated by another service held in the open air on the same day of the year. As the location of the first service was in what is now the parish of St. Luke's, Rev. R. P. McKim, rector of that parish, is taking the lead in the arrangements for the anniversary service. The place where the first service was held, and where its memory will be recalled by the observance on the evening of the coming July 2, has been identified as an area now owned partly by J. S. Gregory and partly by the Maritime Nail Works. Permission for its use has been secured; a platform will be erected for those taking a leading part and the service will be conducted under the canopy of the blue sky which formed the only roof for the first worshippers.

The service will be a short one of creative prayer, with an address by Rev. Mr. McKim. Invitations are being sent to the lieutenant-governor and premier of the province, the mayor and commissioners of the city and other prominent citizens. In addition to the rector there will be at least one other speaker, but arrangements for the second address have not been completed. Music will be furnished by the choir of St. Luke's church, which will be augmented for the occasion by other singers.

A graphic description of the first service is given in one of Dr. W. O. Raymond's books on the early history of the province. The clergyman on that occasion was Rev. Thomas Wood, a missionary of the British Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. Mr. Wood was a native of the town of New Brunswick, New Jersey, who had gone to England in 1749 to be ordained by the Bishop of London. He entered the service of the S. P. G. and was sent to Nova Scotia in 1758. His first visit to this part of his field occurred in 1768, when he arrived in St. John on July 1. On the following day, which was Sunday, he conducted service for the English-speaking settlers in the morning and it is this service which is to be commemorated within the next fortnight. The versatility of the missionary and his thorough equipment for his work were demonstrated by the fact that he conducted a service for the French residents in the evening in each case using the language of his congregation.
