ORDER FENCE TO BE PUT UP ON RODNEY WHARF WITHOUT DELAY

The public utility commission yesterday inspected the amended plans for safeguards for the terminals of the St. John Railway Company at Rodney Wharf, W. E., and approved of them. The secretary was instructed to notify the company to proceed with the work of putting up the railings without delay.

At the afternoon session of the public utilities commission yesterday the New Brunswick Telephone Company made application for permission to charge the regular toll of ten cents on every call between St. John and Rothesay and also to place the Rothesay exchange in class C or D. The application was made on behalf of the company by W. A. Ewing, K. C.

The commissioners agreed to a public hearing of the application and fixed the morning of May 23 as the time. The company was ordered to publish notice of the meeting in at least two St. John papers and one Kings county paper.

CLEANING UP THE TOWN

Mayor Commercial—Mayor Bell is to set aside a week in May, after spring house cleaning is over, during which the city teams will be sent to the accumulation of ashes, dirt and rubbish of the winter. Citizens will place what they want taken away at the city office and the city teams will do the rest.

Albert McKinnon, of Toronto, has been awarded the contract for the construction of the pier at Cape Tormentine in connection with the P. E. Island ferry. The figure is \$271,500.

PITIFUL STORY OF A DESERTED CHILD

(Moncton Times).
About 7.30 last evening there was brought into the police station a little waif whose parents have both deserted him and whose only relations in this city are a grandfather and a young brother and sister who are so situated as to be unable to give him the attention he deserves. The little boy is six years of age and is an exceptionally bright looking child. He told Chief Ridout that his name is Alvin Ayres and that he has lived for some time with his grandfather in Westmorland street. He said that the grandfather works in the I. C. R. new shop and that his brother is employed in Lea's mill. His little sister attends the public school. As his grandfather cannot leave the house open while all the rest of the family are away, the little boy has usually been turned out to wander on the streets all day long.
This state of affairs, as may be imagined, was far from satisfactory, and the grandfather last night brought him to the station with a request that he be placed in the municipal home as he was unable to properly care for him. The boy was taken out to the almshouse by one of the officers, but the persons in charge there refused to take him in without a proper permit.
It appears that the child's father and mother have not been living together for some time. The mother is at Chatham, N. B., working in the sardine factories, while the father is somewhere in the United States. Chief Ridout stated that he would try to find a home for the lad somewhere in the city so that he might receive the advantages of an education in the public school. The little fellow is bright and seemed to take his misfortune very cheerfully.

One of First Women Doctors in West

Calgary, Alb., April 24.—Dr. Amelia Yomans, one of the first women to practice medicine in western Canada, died suddenly on Tuesday night of diabetes. She was 71 years old.
Mrs. Yomans was the first president of the Dominion W. C. T. U., organized in Montreal in 1883 and was well known in the maritime provinces as a lecturer.
