practically certain that within a brief period Canada will supplant the United States as the largest producer of newspaper in the world.

The cautious observer may incline to depreciate this rapid development as an indication of over extension and entertain fears of surplus production in excess of readily available markets. Further, since the beginning of the period of depression in 1920, following an acute shortage, which was felt wherever newspaper publishing was an important industry, the world demand has not been large enough to absorb the full capacity production of the industry, and as a result, Germany and the Scandinavian countries, in order to keep their mills running, turned to the markets of the United States. However, this surplus supply is a direct result of a rapidly passing condition of acute trade depression, and the unprecedented domestic demand in the United States together with a growing market in South America will assure Canada of readily available purchasers for her augmented output.

Furthermore, through the operation of provincial pulpwood embargoes, and proximity to almost inexhaustible sources of supply we possess the added advantage of lower production costs over the United States or any foreign competitor. Our Southern neighbor is specially consuming her remaining pulpwood assets and she must have increasing recourse to Canada as a source of supply. This is strikingly indicated by recently published trade figures which show that in fact of the operation of the Fordney Emergency Tariff our increasing outflow of non-dutiable newspaper to the United States has enabled us to partially offset our losses on other commodity exports to that country.
