1843.—January 11th.—Gas Lights were first used in Halifax. 18th. Died, John Howe, Esq., Deputy Post Master General, and Queen's Printer. Mr. John S. Thompson, was shortly after appointed Queen's Printer. 26th.—The Legislative Session was opened. The Hon. Mr. Howe, in consequence of having accepted of the place of Commissioner of Excise, resigned the Speakership, and the Hon. William Young was elected Speaker. 31st.—Lord Falkland was informed by a Dispatch from the Colonial Office, that the treaty with the United States respect-

ing the Boundary Question was ratified.
