Death of the Distinguished Founder
of the Reformed Episcopal Church.
BALTIMORE, June 27.—The Right
Rev. George D. Cummins died at his
residence in Lutherville, Baltimore
county, at 2.15 p. m., yesterday in the
53th year of his age, after a brief ill-
ness from inflammation of the bowels.
Bishop Cummins was born in the
State of Delaware, and brought up in
the Methodist faith. He was gradu-
ated at Dickinson College in 1841. In
1845 he was ordained to the diaconate,
and in 1847 was consecrated a presby-
ter or priest. In 1850 Princeton Col-
lege conferred upon him the title of
D. D. He filled parishes in Virginia

News Summary.
From Late English and Canadian Papers.

The Turkish correspondent of the
Standard writes:—
If the telegrams are to be believed,
which say that "armed Turkish gun
boats are cruising off Widdin, be-
tween that and Negotin, the struggle
is entering on quite a new phase."
From Widdin it is but a few hours
steaming distance to Belgrade, and
the gun boats, if they have come,
might mean to menace that city or to
cover the movements of the Turks
across the river to invade Servia
through Negotin. The latter is a very
important place. When the Turks
gave over the fortress they gave with
it large stores of the very heaviest
smooth-bore Russian cannon, all eight-
inch or ten-inch calibre, some of them
throwing shot of more than 200
pounds weight. When I left about
four weeks ago, the arrangements
were complete for mounting those on
the river walls of the fortress over-
looking the Danube, and the same
will be done, or now most likely has
been done, on the side which com-
mands the summit of Mount Avoin
quickly is but a small mark, whereas
the city, rising like a mountain at the
junction of the river, is a very large
one, and that with long range shells
the houses would get the worst of it,
and it would be poor consolation for
the Turks to hold the town while
the city was burning behind them.

To guard against this eventuality,
an extensive system of dynamite tor-
pedoes is being arranged beneath the
waters over which the gun boats must
come to do anything effectual.
Against the summit of Mount Avoin
in the tenability of Belgrade for more
than a few days. It has always been
taken from the Karamak dan—once a
Turkish cemetery—now being a
private garden, but always a steep
bluff hill, looking down within a
quarter of a mile into the very centre
of Belgrade, and in rear of all its for-
tifications. This hill is to be cut
away with breastworks and redoubts,
while the summit of Mount Avoin
about 2,500 feet high, and command-
ing both the roads which lead into
Belgrade, is to be heavily fortified.
Still, with all these defences, if the
Turks get a footing near it on the
Servian side of the Danube, Belgrade
must fall, but not a week's pro-
visions in it, and no means of getting
any. I hope however, and quite be-
lieve, that the Servians will not be
driven to the last extremities, they
are said to meditate a vengeance
which is too hot to speak of in tem-
perate terms. Nevertheless, it is
perpetrated of both civil and military
without, which is as far as they can
certainly mean of doing it, the
amount it would cost, the time it
would take, and the number of tons
of dynamite it would require. To
explain what I mean I must digress
for a few lines. Every one knows
how low Danube the sharp, craggy
rocks, as far as they are concerned
the Danube is, but it concentrates all
its force and fury below the cataracts
at a place called the Iron Gates. Here,
opposed the small village of Piche-
vitch, it narrows from a width of a
mile to about 180 yards wide, and
with a depth of 500 feet high, it is
retained from the violence of the cur-
rent, of from 800 to 1,000 fathoms.

The mountains on either side of this
are very lofty—nearly 5,000 feet high
—but that on the Austrian side is
1,000 feet higher, and on the river
is a precipitous passage in the iron
fence above the torrent. In fact, where
it is not perpendicular it rather over-
hangs the river. When there is a
very low Danube the sharp, craggy
points of subaqueous rocks begin to
show themselves above water, and
opposed to the passage is a most
formidable barrier. The passage is

formidable barrier.

The most destructive fire, attended
with terrible loss of life, occurred to-
day, at Ay, at the carpet manufac-
ture and wool works of Mr. James
Templeton. The premises comprised
four blocks of buildings. A number
of women who were at work ran out
screaming from the building, exclaim-
ing that they were within unable
to escape. Shortly afterwards flames
shot up through the roof, which fell
in with a crash.

Up to half-past nine to-night the
following persons were reported as
missing, and no doubts are entertain-
ed that they have all perished in the
flames:—James Barr, overman, aged
fifty, residing in Mill Street; Mary
Calney, aged twenty, residing in

Agnes Murray, aged twenty four,

aged eighteen, sister of the above;
Mary Jane McGill, aged thirteen,
Cross street; Mary McDerment, aged
fourteen, Walker street; Jane Dugan,
aged seventeen, George Street; Eliza-
beth McConnell, aged sixteen, Russell
street; Margaret Mitchell, aged
thirteen, Cross street; Martha Reid,
aged fourteen, Church street; Martha
Colvin, aged nineteen, Garrison street;
Catherine Gillan, aged fifteen, George

The Shipping Bill.
The Toronto *Globe* publishes the
following cable dispatch:—"A Com-
mittee of Cabinet Ministers
consisting of the Lord Chancellor,
Chancellor of the Exchequer, Duke
of Richmond and Lord Carnarvon
have considered Mr. Smith's repre-
sentations, urging changes in the ship-
ping bill in favor of Canadian Ship-
ping. Lord Carnarvon informed Mr.
Smith that the Committee had decided
to recommend that the Canadian
deck-load law should be restored to
the bill in the House of Lords. If
this is carried, vessels sailing in Eng-
land between the 1st of October and
15th of April, may carry three feet of
deck load. The Committee recom-
mended also that provisions in the
unseaworthy clauses should only be
instigated in Canada by consent of the
Governor General, and that a Cana-
dian Assessor be appointed on the
recommendation of the Government
of Canada. The penalty under the
grain loading clause is to be reduced
from three hundred to one hundred
pounds. Ships engaged in the coast-
ing trade of Canada are exempted—
Deck space is to be measured and
added to register tonnage. The act
will not apply to vessels trading in
Inland Waters between United States
and Canada. The Committee declines
to recommend exemption of Cana-
dian vessels from unse
