Its main provisions are: "That no horse-racing or other racing, and no fairs, fetes or ohter public exhibitions shall be permitted upon any premises which the corporation of the city of Victoria either owns or controls save under a permit in that behalf to be applied for to the mayor and council, the permit to be signed by the mayor and the sea of the city attached. The permit so granted shall contain such regulations and conditions governing the condi-tios governing the use of any such public premsies as the council may see fit to impose in each case, and so that any permit so granted shall terminate and be revoked on demand by the mayor of the city for the time being on any breach of any such regu-

ations and conditions. "Provided always that no such permit shall be necessary in the case of the holding of exhibitions confined solely to agricultural (including horse shows, without racing) horticultural, floricultural or fruit, dairying or exhibitions of other industries, or amateur athletic or gymnastic exhibits.


