

POWELL WASTED WHILE FORENOON DIGING INTO PRIVATE BANK ACCOUNTS

(Continued from page one.) Far as the account concerns the railway. E. C. Elkin was put on the stand and was asked where he and Mr. Evans raised the money they spent on the Central Railway. Witness replied that they got some of it in advance from the N. B. C. & R. Co. Other amounts were raised through notes discounted at the Bank of N. B. They did not financing through any other bank.

when they did transfer it to the N. B. C. and R. Co? Witness said that they had to keep the road running until it was taken over and these expenditures were larger than they expected. Witness thought he had seen an agreement by which the N. B. C. and R. Co. finally agreed to take over the road; he thought the price was about \$180,000. Judge Landry asked if Elkin and Evans were not really go-betweens in this matter. Mr. Elkin said that this was not so; as far as he knew they were acting for themselves. Judge Landry read an extract from a report made by Mr. Evans dated 2nd April, 1903 in which he stated that \$300,000 had been paid on account of the purchase of the road by the N. B. C. and R. Co. and another payment of \$12,000 on the option as then data and asked if this did not go to show that it was really the Railway Co. which held the option. Mr. Powell said that the counsel had no right to question the evidence unless it concerned the interests of their clients. Mr. Barnhill asked for a decision on this. Mr. Carvell rose to object to the method of investigation. If the commission waited until Mr. Pugsley could be present he could give all the information wanted regarding the disposition of the bonds. Judge Landry said that when asked for adjournment he could not indefinitely postpone the investigation for Mr. Pugsley. If the counsel could name a date when Mr. Pugsley would be present and could say that Mr. Pugsley, when he appeared, would give the information he would be willing to adjourn the hearing until then. Mr. Carvell hoped by five o'clock to give the data Mr. Pugsley could be present. The examination of Mr. Blair was continued. He said the only entry for N. B. C. & R. Co. hypothecated referred to fourteen bonds numbered \$1 to \$14 inclusive, deposited \$8 August, 1903. During 1903 the maximum was \$5,500 during March and while current the minimum was in January and was \$200. The advances ceased August, 1903, when they stood at \$300. Mr. Powell then asked for a list of securities held to secure this paper. Mr. Blair said that the N. B. C. and R. Co. in favor of Elkin and Evans for \$5,000, dated Sept. 15, 1902, and deposited with Sept. 1902. It was to secure a note of Elkin's and Evans' for \$3,072, due Oct. 15. Another of the same kind was deposited on Nov. 18, 1902, to secure advances of \$5,000, due Jan. 30 and \$3,000 due Jan. 1, 1903. The next security was dated Feb. 18, 1903, drawn by Evans in favor of Elkin to secure a note due April 24th for \$5,000. A similar note was submitted March 23 to secure \$3,000 due 21st May. On May 21, 1903, N. B. C. and R. Co.'s note of \$5,000 was deposited as security for an advance of \$2,800. Another of the same kind was deposited to secure \$2,600 due 11th July and \$2,500 due 28th Aug. On 28th Aug., 1903, thirty first mortgage debentures of N. B. C. and R. Co., Nos. 545 to 574 inclusive, for \$500 each, guaranteed by the province, were deposited to secure a note for \$10,000 due Sept. 13. Three days after \$5,000 was put on account and in this way the liability of the notes in any account entered on the liability ledger did not reach the larger amount. On 9th Sept. securities were returned to Elkin and Evans. Mr. Powell pointed out a note under discount in January, 1903, for \$5,000, signed by Geo. W. Allan, in favor of Elkin and Evans. Mr. Powell asked if Mr. Blair had any further hypothecation of N. B. C. and R. Co.'s bonds for any other paper. Mr. Blair said that he had none. Mr. Carvell objected to going into private account for such information. These bonds were on the market and had been raised money on them. Judge Landry held that in order to trace all the bonds it was necessary to get this information. On Mr. Teed objecting the question was changed to apply only to bonds hypothecated by anyone connected with the N. B. C. and R. Co. Mr. Barnhill claimed the proper way to trace the bonds was through the persons who first received them, instead of starting backwards through the bank.
