Coun. S. H. Fl-welling moved in amendment that a grant of \$300 be made to the Sussex and Stodolnham Agricultural Society, and a like amount to every other agricultural society in the county, to be paid during 1911, and that the grant be not made until the grant by the town of Sussex is paid.
