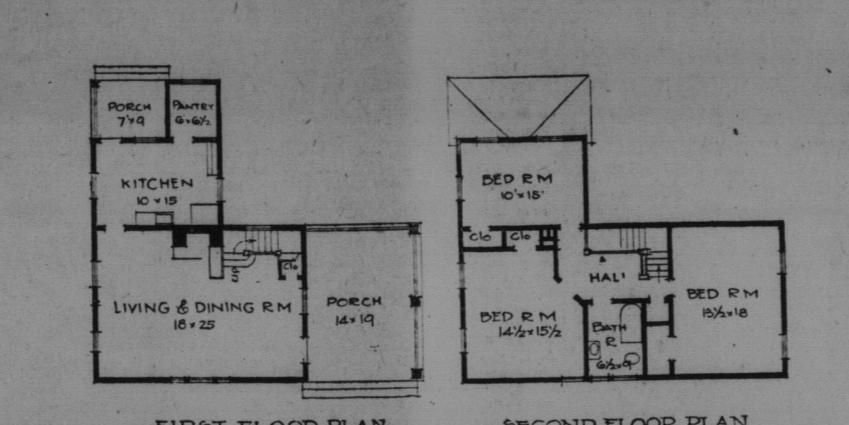

**GERMANS CROSS THE FRENCH BORDER IN FORCE**

Paris, Aug. 2.—France was rewarded by Germany without a declaration of war according to advice received at the war office late today. The Germans are reported to have crossed the border from Avricourt and near Cirey and from Saarburg in Lorraine and to have been accompanied by an artillery and cavalry. Details of what happened are meagre. One report says that 2,000 Germans were engaged by the French forces that are concentrated between Nancy and the border and were driven back with heavy losses.
