## CITY VOTES \$1,000 TO HELP ONTARIO FIRE SUFFERERS

Engineer McGinnis to be Engaged for Water and Sewerage Department for Two Months' Term—Demonstrator to Teach Firemen Proper Care of Motor Apparatus—Other Business at Yesterday's Council Meeting.

At yesterday's meeting of the city council it was decided to subscribe \$1,000 toward the funds for the relief of fire sufferers in Northern Ontario. Authority was given for the pooling of the unexpended balances in the fire and police departments and the commissioner of public safety was given power to employ a demonstrator to instruct civic employees in the proper handling of the motor apparatus belonging to the city. A request for the city to pave Brunswick street the property owners to pay half the cost in labor was received and laid over. The matter of the harbor survey was not brought up but will be discussed at the committee meeting at noon on Thursday. Commissioner Wigmore was authorized to secure the services of Engineer McGinnis for two months at \$800 per month and to call for tenders for the evacuation and back fill at Lake Latimer. The meeting was called to order at three o'clock by His Worship the mayor and all the commissioners were present together with the common clerk.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended that the order of council of the 8th day of August instant instructing the chamberlain to collect one-half of the account of \$437.71 paid for repairs to the Union wharf, be rescinded, it having been put in the report of your commissioner under a misunderstanding.

That a renewal lease issue to John Casey of Lot No. 516, Brooks ward for 7 years from 1st May last at \$18.15 a year rental being 10 per cent. on the present rental.

That the account of J. A. Gregory of \$1,147.71 contract price for deals furnished for repairs to South Rodney wharf be paid. Recommendations adopted.

The commissioner of public safety recommended that the unexpended balance of the fire department appropriation for the remainder of the year be cut into one fund to meet the expenditure of whatever part of the service requires the outlay.

That he be given authority to employ the services of a competent person to demonstrate the working of the auto fire apparatus, etc.

That the unexpended balances of the police department appropriation for the remainder of the year be put in one fund to meet the expenditure of whatever part of the service requires the outlay. Recommendations adopted.

The commissioner of public works recommended that the application of Messrs. Raymond & Doherty for permission to erect an electric sign over their entrance on King street to the Royal hotel be granted on the usual terms. Adopted. He reported having had a verbal request from Louis J. Corey that the city pave with cement the roadway, cutters and sidewalks in Brunswick street from Brusse's street to Erin street. Mr. Corey and the other property owners and occupiers to contribute the entire amount of labor required in the work, some all of the cost and a sufficient amount of money in addition to bring their contribution up to one-half the total cost, which is roughly estimated at \$4,700.

As the commissioner did not have a very high opinion of cement for road ways he recommended that an effort be made to induce Mr. Corey to have his offer apply to some other paving material and that the city arrange to accept his proposition when in a position to issue bonds for the work.

Commissioner McLellan asked the commissioner of public works if he knew of any city where cement was by city detectives. Coleman was remanded.

Frank Leger, charged with keeping a disorderly house, was told to get out of town. A sentence of six months in jail and a fine of \$60 was allowed to stand.

Stephen Conway, on charge of lying and luring, was remanded.

R. W. Carson was fined \$10 for not giving a signal on the corner of Main and Mill streets when passing in his automobile.

Arthur London was fined \$10 for allowing his 15-year-old nephew to drive a wood team.
