# were not molested but George Todd was not one of that stamp; he loved his country and when it was in danger was willing to fight for it. He had enlisted and gone overseas with the first contingent and until the day of his death had not met with an accident of any kind. He was to be honored because he had made the supreme sacrifice. On the 9th day of July last a shell burst in the battery in which he was serving, killed he and some others, and wounded 14. He was sleeping today in a grave in Belgium along with hundreds of other Canadian boys who had paid the price, and while the family mourned they had the comfort of knowing that he fell in a righteous cause. God had honored him and while his body was in Belgium the spirit was with the God who gave it and the family and friends would one day meet him again on that other shore where there was no parting.
