MUNICIPAL CHAPTER I. O. D. E. HELD FIRST ANNUAL MEETING

Yesterday Afternoon in the Government Rooms Members of All Primary Chapters Listed to Accounts of the Year's Work—Splendid Records of Patriotic Activity—Election of Officers—Mrs. A. W. Adams is New Regent.

The aim of the Municipal Chapter, I. O. D. E., is the training up of the work of the Primary Chapters under its jurisdiction, and at the first annual meeting, held yesterday, a very fine record of patriotic activities was presented, showing that both individuals and chapters are collectively as a Municipal Chapter the Order is doing a magnificent work in the community and has widespread sympathies.

There are two million too many women in England and Wales," said Dr. Murray Leslie in a lecture at the Institute of Hygiene recently on the "disproportion of the sexes," and those women present heard a few solid, home truths about themselves.

POINCARÉ TO HEAD REPARATIONS BODY

Acceptance Shows Germany Will Not be Permitted to Evade Treaty.

Paris, Feb. 24.—Acceptance by Raymond Poincaré, formerly President of France, of the post as president of the Interallied Reparations Commission, is interpreted everywhere in Paris as a sure sign that Germany will not be permitted to evade, as she is planning to do, the terms of the Treaty of Versailles.

It is known here that the Germans hoped for the appointment of a man of less forcible character than M. Poincaré. Therefore, the news that he had been named to head the commission and had accepted the appointment came as a distinct shock to the Germans.

M. Poincaré decided several days ago that he would accept the post. When his name was first mentioned in connection with a probable appointment it caused surprise and some persons refused to consider it seriously. However, everywhere here it was known that he had accepted the post.

It may be authoritatively said that he goes to his new task with determination to extract from Germany every bit of the reparation due to France, even to the last brick.

It may well be remembered in this connection that M. Poincaré himself was a sufferer from Germany's ruthlessness. His house, in the Department of the Meuse was destroyed by German shell fire. He has frequently been heard to express the opinion that Germany should be compelled to pay every franc demanded of her by the Allies, and his attitude in this regard has been noted by his colleagues on the commission.

The official announcement of M. Poincaré's appointment was made this morning. It is expected that the actual work of treaty enforcement in connection with reparations will begin immediately. The commission will meet three times a week.

Work on Documents contains charges by the French against Germany war criminals is expected to be finished March 15 and the documents delivered to the Supreme Court in Leipzig, so that the necessary court records may be made. A commission under the chairmanship of Jules Camille is proceeding with this work. The trial of the Germans cannot be held before May 1, it was said today. It may be several years before all the accused have been tried.

It is known here that the German Government will make a strong effort to have the jurisdiction of the Leipzig court extended to permit the trial of committing various crimes in districts where the Germans held, neither he nor his troops were stationed and at periods when he was in retirement in Switzerland. The evidence against him was said to be supported by certain French officers, and Germany probably will ask that these officers be compelled to testify in person. Should they fail to prove the charges Germany would be able to arrest them while they were on German soil and to hold them on charges of perjury.

It was reported that the German Government had several cases similar to this and that she would insist that the jurisdiction of the Leipzig court be complete, holding that this was necessary if justice was to be administered properly.

Way to Restore Exchange Rate Give up Your Gold and Serve Your Country.

"This country needs one more service from all of us. It needs our gold—the actual metal that adorns us or ornaments our home," says the London Daily Express, which makes the following remarkable suggestion, based on the Germans' war precedent:—

Great Britain owes to America a large debt contracted in and for the war. In round figures that debt now stands at \$850,000,000. Not so very far from a thousand millions.

We owe this money to America, and there is there can be no question as to the duty and necessity of paying it. It is a debt of honor and an international obligation on which the credit of our country depends. But we cannot pay at once. Creditors are accustomed to means of liquidating such obligations. It is no longer feasible. Goods are not available in sufficient quantities. One way remains. We can pay our debt in gold.

In the homely which he read to Europe, Mr. Carter Glass, Secretary of the United States Treasury, exclaimed: "Send us your gold." Let us do it. A Call to Patriotism.

Your watch-chain, your ring, your sleeve-links, your bag purses, cigarette-cases, match-boxes, your gold dinner service—all these things are dress things. They are unproductive. They earn nothing for you, they advance no claim of interest on the State. Many of them are duplicates, many are seldom used. Few have that intimate sentimental value which can only be foregone with tears.

Between us in all the homes of this country, we have gold enough to liquidate our American debt, to pay off our foreign creditor.

It is not suggested that all these gold trinkets and gew-gaws should be surrendered to the State without equivalent. Such a plan would mean that the burden of sacrifice would fall unequal on the rich and the poor. In exchange for the gold, the State would issue bonds bearing interest. You would give up a personal property, you would receive an investment secured on the national resources of your country. You would do excellent business and help your country.

The remedies suggested by Dr. Leslie to rearrange the present disproportionate state of affairs were the emigration of women to the colonies and the adoption and care of babies.

"It would be a very good thing," he concluded, "if a princess or some other notable personality set the fashion of adopting and rearing boy babies." London Times.
