He said it did not wish to hear all the things from a party position, although he said that private ownership would not only prove detrimental to the port but to the country as a whole, though the private companies, by routing their freight to Portland in preference to St. John, would satisfy their own ends by depriving local manufacturers of markets. He said he had been destined to be called to the great interests, but it was the greatest interests who deserved the taking over of the Government railways by private corporations, and it was the benches of the legislative party who favored such a course.
