

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Special Telegram to the Tribune. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 21. Mr. Coram suggested, at the conclusion of Mr. Donald's speech yesterday, that the liquor bill be amended so that shops would close at 10 in summer and 9 in winter.

Mr. Ryan would close all the taverns till the last day. Hon. Mr. King said his mind had fluctuated, as it were, somewhat on liquor legislation. He defended himself from the charges made in the pulp on account of his vote last session, and expressed his intention to oppose the bill separating the sale of liquor from the sale of groceries and excluding bars from billiard saloons.

Mr. Maher introduced a bill relating to the Saint John Hospital. Hon. Mr. Fraser, a bill relating to Fredericton City Hall Loan; Mr. Humphrey, a bill to incorporate the Town of Moncton; Mr. Harrison, a bill relating to assessments in Burton.

Mr. Hibbard introduced a bill incorporating the Lake George Railway Company, and presented the petition of the inhabitants of St. Stephen asking aid in the construction of the Grand Southern Railway. The petition was not received.

Mr. Donald, chairman of the committee to consider the bill incorporating the Foster and McAdam Brook Driving Company, read a favorable report.

Mr. Crawford committed the House for the further consideration of his Liquor Bill. The 24th section, relating to Fredericton, was struck out. There was a lengthy discussion on the 27th section, which passed with a slight amendment.

Mr. Gough most strenuously opposed the 31st section, isolating the sale of liquor. Messrs. Crawford, Hibbard, Landry, and Willis supported, while Messrs. Beckwith and Donald opposed it. The House rose.

The Hon. Mr. Bailey presented a petition praying for the incorporation of the Grand Orange Association.

The House went into Committee on a bill for incorporating the Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick and subordinate lodges.

There will be no train for Fredericton this afternoon, in consequence of the storm.

The new boat and show firm of Messrs. Jackson & Son, who were so suddenly turned out by the late fire at Foster's Corner, have resumed business at the old stand with a large stock of goods.

The Directors of the Victoria Skating rink held a meeting at the President's office at 4.30 p. m., this day, to consider some cases of misbehavior by ticket-holders. The offenders have been cited to attend and show cause why they should not be expelled.

Last evening the guests at the Victoria Hotel were surprised to see a large party suddenly appear in full dress and take possession of the tea room. What is it? Who are they? were the questions asked, and every one was on the tip-toe of expectation.

New York, March 20.

LONDON, March 20. Bullion in the Bank of England has increased £38,000 during the week.

Gladstone will announce in the House of Commons to-night (Thursday) his decision to remain in office with all his colleagues.

A renewal of Wolverhampton riots is threatened one hundred men have been arrested. The English miners threaten to strike unless the Irish employes are discharged. The shopkeepers, apprehending rioting, are closing their places of business, and there is much alarm among the citizens.

The Car-Hoek Murderer Hanged.

New York, March 21.

Foster, who murdered Putnam with a car-hoek, was hanged at 9.15 this forenoon. The execution was witnessed only by officials and reporters.

A Wife-Murderer Hanged.

Boston, March 21.

McElheny, the wife-murderer, was hanged at 11 this forenoon. The execution was private.

Ontario-Quebec Arbitration--Three Years Work for the Election Committee--Ontario's Cant about New Brunswick's Expenditures.

Ottawa, March 21.

Hon. Mr. Robertson, Treasurer, Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Solicitor General of Quebec, and Judge Day, are in the city in connection with the Quebec and Ontario arbitration question. A battalion of lawyers also arrived to take part in the trial of the election petitions.

The Senate was yesterday occupied in discussing the North Western question. It will be fully three years before the last election case can be tried.

Several Ontario members give as a reason for their opposition to Better Terms that New Brunswick gives no evidence of a desire to lessen legislative expenses in that Province now, and that Sir John Macdonald has stated the intention of the Government to deal fairly with us if it would come opportunely if the New Brunswick Legislature would take steps to give itself Better Terms by making reductions in unnecessary expenses of Government.

Ontario has only five heads of Departments. The reforms indicated, if made by our Government, would secure the support of many Ontario men to Better Terms who now oppose them and would greatly strengthen the hands of the Dominion Government when they ask Parliament to consent to the measure.

LONDON, March 20--Evening.

THE END OF THE CABINET CRISIS--EXPLANATIONS OF GLADSTONE, DISRAELI AND OTHERS.

The House of Commons presented an unusual spectacle to-day in anticipation of the important communications from Gladstone announcing the termination of the Ministerial Crisis by his return to office. All the benches were filled with members and the galleries were crowded with spectators.

Among the distinguished persons present were Prince Arthur, the Duke of Cambridge and Prince Christian. Many members of the House of Lords also attended the sitting.

As Gladstone and Disraeli entered the House, loud cheers were successively raised by their respective supporters. When Gladstone rose to make his statement, the cheering was repeated, this time from all parts of the Chamber.

He said he was now able to acquaint the House with the fact that he and his colleagues in office, with Her Majesty's permission, were prepared to carry on the Government as before. He explained fully that it was only after the party opposite had unconditionally refused to form a Ministry that he and his friends had consented to resume office.

Disraeli explained the course he had thought proper to pursue since the beginning of the crisis. He confessed that the differences between himself and the Irish Catholics were unsurmountable.

In the House of Lords Granville announced the decision of the Government in a speech differing little from that of Gladstone's.

The Duke of Richmond defended the conduct of the leaders of the Opposition in the crisis. It had been asked, if Disraeli was not willing to undertake the task of forming a Ministry why did he labor to put the Government in a minority in the House of Commons? He combated the idea of inconsistency and eulogized Disraeli, who, he declared, had increased the lustre of his fame as a statesman by his wise, patriotic and unselfish action in the present emergency.

THE FINANCES.
