



Alberta Teachers Take A Leaf Out Of Trade Union Book and Demand Wage Schedule with Minimum \$1200 At the joint meeting of the Executives of the Trades' Council and the Labor Party, held September 17, it was unanimously agreed that it should be

The Executive is evidently convinced that, as a result of the wave of enthusiasm in the cause of organization which is sweeping over the teaching body, the time has now arrived for the Alliance to nake use of its strength-to take a leaf out of the Trades Union book, perfect its organization and once and for all put an end to the methods heretofore adopted by the teachers: no longer will it be necessary to go, cap in hand, to the employers, and Ol⁵ver Twist-like "ask for more," but present rea-sonable demands with an assurance that the whole of the personnel of the provincial teachers is behind the demands and prepared to back them up.
