BANKING—PREFERENCE TO SMALL BORROWERS

Question No. 2,610-Mr. Robinson:

Is the federal government considering a policy to regulate banking so that small borrowers receive preference over large borrowers when credit is limited?

Hon. E. J. Benson (Minister of Finance): No. The federal government does not have statutory power to regulate banking so that small borrowers would receive preference over large borrowers. Moreover I consider any such legal regulation would be impractical. However, in his appearance before the House of Commons Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs, the Governor of the Bank of Canada indicated that he has expressed the view to the executives of the banks that they should have special regard for borrowers in less prosperous areas of the country and for small businesses that do not have alternative sources of credit.
