of the Canadian Government to interest all sections of the Dominion in order to continue industrial development at the peak level.

Canada would then soon be sending Canadian goods throughout the world in Canadian bottoms, he added, amidst applause from both sides of the House.

Referring to the expenditures of the Tomlinson & Northern Ontario Railway Mr. McGarry pointed out that the total revenue amounted to \$2,312,310, while the total expenditures reached \$2,390,302. Net earnings amounted to \$429,000.

It is estimated during the next year that the present expenses to be provided for in connection with the hydro developments will total \$8,454,910. Mr. McGarry said, "of which some \$5,187,000 will be expended in connection with the Chippewa scheme. The remainder will be spent for improvements at Fort William, St. Lawrence, Severn and other systems. It is now estimated that the whole scheme of improvements will call for \$11,000,000 so that an additional \$1,000,000 will have to be raised to carry on the work and improvements.

Provincial War Tax of One Mill Dropped

The Budget Figures

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loans and to provide for special requirements of the construction period. The estimated revenue of the province for the year is \$18,408,000, and the estimated expenditure \$18,408,000 which can include \$11,000,000 to be expended for hydro-electric development and extension throughout the province.

The above facts, together with the announcement that the war tax of one mill imposed on municipalities of Ontario since 1915 has been collected for the last time, were the features comprised in the budget which Hon. T. W. McGarry, provincial treasurer, presented to the Ontario Legislature, this afternoon.

The minister delivered a comprehensive address which gave evidence of careful preparation and forethought and which covered almost every point in the budget, to the apparent satisfaction of the majority of the members of both sides of the House.

Mr. McGarry announced that Ontario this year has the highest surplus in its history, \$1,809,000, which is an increase of \$68,000 over the 1917 surplus, which had set a record in its turn. The total revenue of the province in 1918 was \$17,270,123, an increase of \$1,000,000 over that for the previous year.

Abolition of the war tax on municipalities, while advocated by many and demanded for by some, came rather as a surprise to the majority and the treasurer's announcement was greeted with applause from both sides of the House.

Dealing with charges made during the recent by-election that the province had a total liability of \$75,000,000, the minister admitted that this was correct, but claimed that critics of the Government did not touch

the other side of the question at all. The total liquid assets of the Government were \$75,000,000. Mr. McGarry declared himself proud of the debt for it represented advancement on the part of the people of Ontario, O. and E. and E. and E.

The Tomlinson & Northern Ontario Railroad, for instance, was every year making a deficit of nearly \$600,000. Nevertheless Mr. McGarry approved the road, which he argued had been built for accommodation and not as a money maker. At the same time he expressed confidence that it would not be long before the line became a paying investment.

Reference to hydro-electric matters was received with applause from both sides of the House. Mr. McGarry asked the Opposition whether they approved the \$4,000,000 spent on hydro and the \$22,000,000 on the Tomlinson & Northern Ontario. He announced that the hydro last year had paid to the last cent its interest to the Government, \$1,400,000.

In addition to \$75,000,000 of liquid assets, Mr. McGarry continued the Government had \$22,000,000 invested in public buildings throughout the province and \$503,000,000 of other assets, which it could resolve into cash at any time, having thus total assets of approximately \$600,000,000 against its liabilities of \$75,000,000. The Province of Ontario, he declared stood preeminent in the financial world, both of America and of Europe. It had never gone into an undertaking requiring large expenditures unless assured of returns, either immediate or remote. Last year the Province had never paid higher than 6 1/2 per cent. interest on money borrowed, and since the close of the war had done even better.

Good Financing
Mr. McGarry stated that he had recently borrowed \$1,000,000 in New York at 5 1/2 per cent. and had concluded negotiations by which the net cost to the Government for six months would be only 1.82 per cent. He declared that no Government should enter long-period obligations at present rates of interest, for within three years the British market would be open once more and would become once more the world's financial center.
