Vaccination gives all but absolute protection against this disease. The operation is a trifling one, and if properly care be taken there is little resultant inconvenience. The unfortunate results which have occasionally followed vaccination have been consequent upon carelessness on the part of the person vaccinated.
Every unvaccinated person is liable to develop the disease.
Who has the right to subject a community to the expense and inconvenience which results to it when a case of smallpox develops?

A Bitter Pill.

Sir,—The violation of the neutrality of Belgium, with its attendant horrors, was one of the bitterest pills ever concocted for a national conscience to swallow. It was too bitter for Great Britain, but the United States took it down, however bitter with various qualms.
The pill that has been compounded of the elements which entered into the dismissal of Colonel E. M. Beck, with from the offices of S. Pendergast, the offices of S. Pendergast and Justice of the Peace is now being presented to the voters of Kings county. We know the ingredients. They were personal spite, enmity to temperance men and temperance legislation, with a monstrous perversion of justice to compass these ends. It is one of the worst doses that a British citizen could possibly be asked to swallow, and we shall watch with interest its reception by the self-respecting men of the constituency.
All who love fair play, who appreciate faithful service of church and state, who prize loyalty to friends, will have the opportunity on the 20th day of June of saying, in the most emphatic way, what they think of the violation of these principles.
Like most bitter pills this one will have a varied reception. Some will take it on the principle of the old saying, "Open your mouth and shut your eyes, &c." Some will go on with Bethmann-Hollweg's idea, "The wrong done we acknowledge, and when our military (party) purpose is served we shall make reparation." Others will but brantly say, "Served him right to be meddling with our business and that of our friends." Many will sheepishly take the dose, shaking God for the secret ballot. Some will hope that the sugar-coating may be made as thick as possible. But there will be a goodly number who will put it away as a poisonous thing. It is said that a politician during this bloody war is finding her soul—that the spirit of pure patriotism is triumphing over the mean and sordid amongst that afflicted people.
An election campaign is a snuff-taking experience, and no more fitting motto could be hung in the polling booth on June 20th than the saying of Him who became a victim of party prejudice, "What shall I profit if I gain, if I shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?"

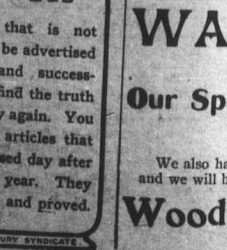
