The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church met in the Synod House, Queen Street, Edinburgh, on Monday, 12th May, and on successor days till the Friday cremng following. The Rev. APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION.—The committee on bills and overtures recommended that a committee should be appointed to consider certain applications for admission into this church, from partie who awished to be received with the standing of preachers and students of theology. RIGHTS OF RULING ELDERS.—The clerk read a digest of reports received from predyteries and seesons on the remit as to ruling elders taking part in the ordination of ministers. Thirteen presbyteries and thirteen sessions were unfavourable to a change; four presbyteries and fine sessions were favorable to a change; four presbyteries and four sessions were not prepared to report on the subject.

REPORT ON SCHOLARSHIPS -Dr King read the Report on Scholarships, of which the following is an abstract :-
