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IN ENGLAND, THOUGH, THE POSITION IS VERY DIFFERENT.

DOLLINGER, THE GREAT GERMAN THEOLOGIAN, ONGE DESCRIBED THE ANGLICAN CHURCH AS A "COLLECTION OF HETEROGENEOUS THEOLOGICAL PROPOSITIONS TIED TOGETHER BY AN ACT OF UNIFORMITY." TO WHICH DEAN INGE HAS REPLIED THAT IT IS TIED TOGETHER BY SOMETHING MUCH BETTER THAN AN ACT OF PARLIAMENT—BY THE NATIONAL CHARACTER, ADDING THAT IN NO OTHER COUNTRY IS THERE A STRONGER NATIONAL TYPE AND IN NO NATIONAL HISTORY HAS RELIGION PLAYED A LARGER PART.

WITHIN THE LAST GENERATION PARLIAMENTARY LEGISLATION HAS REMOVED ALMOST ALL THE FEATURES WHICH SEEMED TO PLACE MONCON-FORMITY IN AN INFERIOR POSITION TO ANGLICANISM SO THAT DISCUSSED AS LITTLE MORE THAN AN ACADEMIC QUESTION.

CONSTITUTIONALLY, HOWEVER, THE KING IS THE HEAD OF THE
ANGLICAN CHURCH, AND FOR THIS TO REMAIN IF SUCH A MARRIAGE AS THAT
PROPOSED IS EFFECTED WOULD CERTAINLY BE INTOLERABLE FOR THE ANGLOCATHOLICS AND INDEED FOR A MUCH GREATER PROPORTION OF CHURCH
OPINION.
