this wealth, with the affiftance of two or three of the crew, (the veffel being his father's) threw the young Spaniard over-board, and on his return appeared greatly diffreffed by the lofs of his friend, who he pretended had died at fea of a fever .-- For fome time this fucceeded, but at length on a quarrel between two of the failors concerned in the murder, the whole bufine's transpired : the mer. were feized, and initantly accufed young De Burgh .- The wretched father was obliged to mount the tribunal, to fit in judgment on his only fon, and with his own lips to pronounce that fentence which left him childlefs, and at once blafted, for ever, the honour of an ancient and noble family .-. His fellow -citizens, who revered his virtues and pitied his misfortunes, faw with aftonishment the fortitude with which he yielded to this cruel neceffity, and heard him doom his fon to a public and ignominious death on the following morning .- Their compation for the father, their affection for the man, every nobler feeling was roufed, and they privately determined to refcue the young man from the prifon that night, under the conviction that De Burgh, having already paid the tri bute due to justice and his honour, would fecretly rejoice at the prefervation of the life of his fon .- But they little knew the heart of this noble magistrate .- By fome accident their determination reached his ear; he inftantly removed his fon from the prifon to his own houfe, and after partaking with him the office of the ho ly communion, and giving and receiving a mutual forgiveness, he caufed him to be hung at his own door ; a dreadful monument of the vengeance of Heaven, and an immortal proof of a juffice that leaves every thing of the kind in ftory at an immea furable diftance.

The father immediately retigned his office, and after his death, which fpeedily followed that of his fon, the citizens fixed over the door of the house a skull and bones, which remain there to this day.

AMERICA.

The following is a Statement of LAND, belonging to the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

THE whole territory of the United States contains by computation a million of fquare miles, in which are 640 millions of acres; deduct for water 51 millions of acres. The total amount of acres of land in the United States is 580 millions.

That part of the United States comprehended between the Wefl temporary line of Pennfylvania on the Eafl; the boundary line between Britain and the United States extending from the river St. Croix, to the North wefl extremity of the Lake of the woods on the North; the river Miffifippi to the mouth of the Ohio on the Wefl, and the river Ohio on the South-the afore mentioned bounds of Pennfylvania, contains by computation about 411,000 fquare miles, in which are 26,340,000 acres. Deduct for waters 4,340,000 acres. There remains 220 millions of acres.

The whole of this immenfe extent of unappropriated weftern territory or vacant unfettled land, containing as above flated, 220 millions of acres, has been by the ceffion of fome of the origina
