

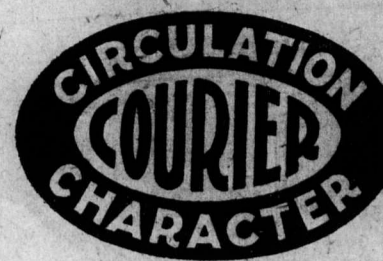

There were able to give \$100 as a parting gift to the 215th Battalion and \$150.00 to the furnishing of a room in the home for returned soldiers. One member made the curtains for the room and the 215th Battalion. We have purchased \$160.00 (one hundred and sixty) worth of wool and have sent off 325 pairs of hand knitted socks to our men in the trenches and the navy and have 25 pairs on hand and the greater part of the last purchase of wool.

The chapter gratefully acknowledged our many gifts \$38.50 from Mrs. C. Battaglia and \$10.00 from Mrs. Bell—part of her gift in aid of Brantford soldiers and many from our members which have added materially to the funds—and others towards the comforts for the chapters room in the Soldiers' Home.

Before our books are closed on last year's work, our energies are directed to other enterprises which require immediate attention. An appeal is made this month for socks for our brave allies the French—there is a shortage of wool in France and the men are lamentably short of socks and we will be called on shortly to bid farewell to the man now quartered here—let us do our little best for these worthy causes. ## FLYING CORPS WILL ACCEPT CLASS I MEN

Keeness and Clear Brains Rather than Physique Needed

Men called up in Class I under the M.S.A. will be allowed to apply for enlistment in the Royal Flying Corps. The usual exacting standards of this branch of the service will be maintained. It has been found that only men of certain qualifications can wisely be accepted in the flying service. Chief among these is youth. The aviator must have the gift of acting instantaneously—there is no time for second thought in air fighting. Experience shows that it is chiefly in young men that this quality is obtained. It has been found that as a rule a man of twenty makes a better aviator than the man of 25, and he again better than the man of 25.

Physique is not a prime consideration—lithe, wiry frames are more important than stocky build. Nerve rather than strength is required in carrying out an aviator's duties. In addition he must have the aviator's sixth sense—a perception of "balance." In the early stages men were accepted by the Royal Flying Corps without any tests as to a man's sense of balance, with the consequence that some lives were lost. But today elaborate tests have been devised to establish a man's fitness for flying service. Every applicant under the M.S.A. must submit to these tests. Of course, it is assumed that an aviator has plenty of courage, is animated with a keen spirit to do good work and make progress. Ordinary intelligence and education is demanded, much depending of course on a man's aptitude.

Those men who are fortunate enough to be able to measure up to the R.F.C. standards will find they will be entering a period of training packed with incidents, full of fascination. Promotion is in many cases startlingly rapid—depending entirely on his aptitude as a pilot. While training for commissions as Flight Lieutenants, Cadets will receive the usual rates of pay—\$1.10 a day.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND RESOURCES**  
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and had also been a resident of a British subject territory, may sometimes be granted a portion of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Dominion Lands appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by treaty may be made on certain conditions. Subj—Six months residence upon cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years after entering homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborer in Canada during 1917 as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry on local Agent's office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
