During the recent rebelilion in Chili there must have been many instances of heroism displayed, and one in particular is described in "Park Days of Chili." It was told to the author by the father of the heroine.

"One evening at 6 o'clock, during my absence my daughter was writing some letters for me at a table. Sud denly she heard a crash of broken glass, followed by a loud explosion at the end of the room, and there had been so much bomb work of late that instinctively she guessed what had happened. .

SECRET PROCESS

Oxygen Produced From Air by-Means of Copper tubes

This Will Supply Limitless Quantities of Fuel at a Mere Nominal Cost.

New York, Feb. 23. - At a dinner given at the Players' club Saturday to Raoul Pictet, the Swiss scientist, oxygen was produced from air by a secret process used for the first time in this country. The demonstration was made in the presence of M. Bruwaert, the French consul-general, Edward Sumner, who represented Sir Thomas Lipton, and a lawyer connected with the

general liquid air company.

For the experiment a simple apparatus, consisting mainly of copper tubes, was used. Atmospheric air was taken in at one end and at the other oxygen was shown by the production of a calcium light from the ignition of gas. Liquid air was employed in

mr. Pictet asserts that with a 500horse power plant he can produce daily 500,000 cubic feet of oxygen, 1,000,000 cubic feet of nitrogen and 1,000 cubic feet of carbonic acid gas. The last named product will, it is said, pay for the cost of the entire production and oxygen and nitrogen will represent net profits. As 2,000 cubic feet of oxygen is estimated to be equal in heating power to a ton of coal, the is considered to be of grea value from a commercial standpoint

MILITARY CRITIC.

His Views of the Disasters to the British.

Says the Most Ordinary Precautions were Neglected in the way of Reconneitering.

New York, Feb. 27. - Important reports in regard to the operations of the British army in South Africa have been received by the war de-partment at Washington from Capt. S. L. H. Slocum, military attache with

the British forces.
Criticisms which Capt. Slocum makes of the tactics and personnel of the British army have caused the department to determine that it would be improper to make them public and they have been filed away in the mil-itary information division for use by officers in their studies at the several

military schools.

It is known that Capt. Slocum especially condemns the failure of the British to make proper reconnais-British to make proper reconnais-sances before advancing. He was with Gen. Buller on the Tugela, and says that in his first battle there that says that in his first battle there that officer attempted to cross by two drifts in plain, view of the Boers with absolutely no preliminary attempt to reconnoiter, and that apparently Gen. Buller believed he had only a small force to encounter and would have no difficulty in brushing it aside.

sance he gives as the cause of the disasters sustained by the British at Magersfontein and Stormberg. At Magersfontein Gen. Wauchope ad-vanced at night with his brigade in vanced at night with his brigade in quarter column, to capture a position. No attempt at flanking was made. The men moved forward four deep, stumbling over obstructions, when suddenly a searchlight was turned on them and they became the target for the Boer rifles and guns, which decimated their ranks.

THE MAN WHO DEVELOPS INTO A CHRONIC BORROWER.

Habit Which Brings the Impecuni ous individual Who Cultivates It Dangerously Near the Dishones Line-Don't Be a Beat.

It is old Polonius, in Shakespeare's tragedy of "Hamlet, who says:

Neither a borrower nor a lender be, For loan oft loses both itself and friend, And borrowing dulls the edge of husbandry. This advice he gives to his son, young Laertes, on his departure for France And it contains a world of wisdom in

little space. The chronic borrower exists in every community, and he is a nuisance. How well we all know him under various forms! There is the man who invited you out to drink and then asks you for a \$5 note, to be repaid the next Monday That day never comes, and the lender is obliged to charge the sum to profit and

Then there is the fellow who comes and borrows a small sum, which he repays very promptly, and you think you have seen the last of him. But you are mis-taken. He reappears and asks for the loan of a larger amount, and if you are verdant enough to comply with his request you will never see your money again. Following these comes the cha who is a mere beggar. He wants a half dollar until tomorrow. But he never intends to return it, and you never ex pect him to do this. You give him the coin to get rid of him for the time being. shuffles off to spend it at the

nearest taproom. Now, all these impecunious men were, no doubt, likely lads growing up until they fell into the habit of borrowing. They were probably honest enough in paying their debts at the start, but then came a time when, owing to some extravagant expenditure which they could not afford, they found themselves unable

not allord, they found themselves unable to meet their just debts.

They brazened it out then, and they have continued to brazen it out ever since. They have lost all sense of honor and all self respect and Lave joined the ranks of the Jeremy Diddlers, from which there is little hope of escape. They have no character or standing in the community in which they live, and they that know them best will dodge around the corner when they see them

There is, of course, in trade a legitimate system of borrowing on good security. Business could not be conducted long under ordinary conditions unless some such practice prevailed, but this does not furnish any excuse for the shortcomings of those who obtain loans without any idea of how they are to be

repaid.
"Borrowing dulls the edge of husband ry." as the old courtier in the play truly says. A borrower is necessarily a spend thrift. He never has a bank account because he never saves anything. He has nothing to draw upon but the savings of his acquaintances, on which he has no claim. He may not call himself a dishonest man, but he is not far from it. For instance, he strikes a good natured slob who does not know him very well and by fictitious statements squeez a dollar or two out of a poor innocent who can ill afford to lose it and who, perhaps, needs it for the proper support of his household or for the payment of his weekly bills. That money is never re-turned, as the borrower well knew it would not be when he promised to make it good in a short time. The law may not be able to reach him, but some people would call him a thief. And the

chronic borrower is far from happy.

He has his moments of elation, doubt, like Wilkins Micawber when the punch was brewed, but he has terrible hours of depression when he does not know where the next meal is coming from and when he has exhausted the patience of all his relatives and acquaintances. But he need not be in this pickle if he would resolve to live within his means and not indulge in luxuries which he well knows he cannot afford.

If a man's expenditures do not come within his income, there is bound to be disaster in the end. He will be bankrupt in both fortune and character if he does not wisely regulate his expenses so they may not exceed his salary or the receipts of any business in which he may be engaged.

It is a wise rule for a young man never to buy anything for which he has not the ready money to pay. There is too much temptation in getting things on credit. It leads a man to obtain more than he real ly needs and thus run up large bills

which he finds it difficult to meet. Young fellows are too apt to jest about standing up the tailor or some other tradesman, as if it were a smart thing to keep an honest, hardworking man out of his money. Why is it not a better way to save your earnings until you have the cash to settle a bill at once? In this way you will obtain the respect of your neighbors and gain a reputation that will be of inestimable value to you in any reputable pursuit you may follow. It is just as easy to be a white sheep as a black one and a deal more pleasant in

the end. If you live to be old, you do not want to look back over a wasted life and regret that you did not avoid these extravagances, which, after all, have brough you little or no enjoyment. Do without things rather than borrow.

If you do not practice self denial in youth, you will never attain any position worth having. Perhaps or distinction worth having. Perhaps you do not know what a deadbeat is. Well, he's a liar and a cheat, and that is what the chronic borrower always is. Don't be a beat .- Boston Herald.
