MR. STEPHENS' "MAIDEN SPEECH."

It may incidentally be mention ed that that was Mr. Stephens' "maiden speech" and it was probably the most remarkable one ever heard in the House. Had he simply threatened to bolt in parliament and vote against the administration the government would likely have told him to go ahead. BRITISH JUDICIAL COMMITTEE TO BE REMODELED.

The British government proposes to reorganize the judicial committee of the privy council in order that it may more effectively deal with matters pertaining to the colonies. Apparently it is the intention of the imperial government to assemble a commission on which the colonies are to be represented to draft a sort of constitution, or rather to outline the scope of the duties of the judicial committee on broader lines, in view of the confederation of the Australian colonies and probable confederation in the future of the South African colonies. It is a movement of much importance to the colonies because the work of the committee in connection with Canadian affairs in the past has not been altogether satisfactory!

Canada has been asked to nominate a representative to the commission. and, as one of the most distinguished authorities on Canadian constitutional law, Hon. David Mills will likely be chosen to to England for that purpose, though the selection has not yet been made. The special study which the honorable gentleman has made of the needs of Canada in connection with the work of such a judicial tribunal will render his assistance of great value to the empire in the accomplishment of an undertaking so important to the future of the colonial dependencies.

HOW THE NATION'S MONEY GOES.

WANTS TO PROVE THAT HE IS ALIVE

Funston, near Iola, Kas. is here collecting evidence to prove himself alive. In the civil war Foust had all the back part of his skull torn off by a shell and was thrown on the "dead heap." He has been trying for years to get a pen-sion, but being unable to disprove the records of his death, has not succeed-ed. Gen. 
