TALK ABOUT THE TWO SHAM-ROCKS.

Southampton, May 11.—The broken gaff of the Shamrock II. was sent ashore for repairs immediately after the accident, and every endeavor was put forth with a view to a resumption of the trials to-day, but Captain Seymour says it will be impossible to start before Monday. Both the professional and amateur yachtsmen who have watched the belling mainsail, cut in American fashion, hitherto used in the trials of the Shamrock II., have condemned it as a disgraceful piece of work. The new mainsail which is now being prepared is therefore being cut with the cloth running crosswise, so set as nearly as possible as flat as in the case of the Shamrock I. The trial given the Columbia's pattern of mainsail was in order that the respective merits of the sails might be fully tested. But yachtsmen found that it was not so easy to pick up the power of wind, so they determined to stick to the flat sail to which all British skippers pin their faith.

EDUCATIONAL SUGGESTIONS.

Thomas Scullard, a member of the committee appointed at the meeting of school trustees at Toronto, last month to wait on the Minister of Education with reference to matters affecting the public and high schools of the province, has received notice that the Hon. the Minister of Education, appointed Wednesday, the 15th inst., for an interview with the committee. The subjects on which recommendations will be offered by the committee are as follows:—

1. Local municipalities double contributions to county grants to High Schools.
2. Boards to appoint truancy officers.
3. H. S. support—towns separate from counties.
4. Inspectors' public lectures.
5. Fewer or better county model schools.
6. Mineralogy and geology to be optional on H. S. course.
7. Introduce study of language into public schools.
8. Teachers' records of pupils, to count in H. S. entrance examinations.
9. No teachers under 21 years of age.
10. Better rural P. S. teachers.
- (a) Distinguish principals and assistants.
- (b) Grade salaries according to certificates.
- (c) Legislative duplicate township grant.
