#### WILL BE TOTAL LOSS.

Steamer "Saxon" Stranded in Fog at  
Caribou Island.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., May 18.—  
The steel steamer Saxon, owned by  
the Pittsburgh Steamship Co., strand-  
ed Wednesday during a fog on the  
north side of Caribou Island, Lake  
Superior. It is said she will be a  
total loss.

"We were running a short distance  
ahead of the Saxon," said Captain  
Brown of the steamer E. W. Oglebay,  
"and my steamer must have missed  
the reef which the Saxon struck by  
only a few feet. The Saxon was going  
into full speed and struck the  
rocks with terrific force. I tried to  
get near enough to take the Saxon's  
crew aboard my own ship, but was  
unable to do anything because of the  
danger of running my own steamer  
on the rocks in the storm. The Sax-  
on's men were able later to reach  
the island in small boats."

The wrecked steamer registered  
2,348 tons and was valued at \$110,000.  
She was built in 1890.

law is defeated it will be the fault  
of the people who do not vote at  
all. St. Thomas has had a very un-  
pleasant experience in this respect  
lately. An industrial proposition,  
one which was recognized as a good  
one for the city, was defeated the  
other day, because a sufficient vote  
was not polled. The trouble was  
that there were too many people in  
St. Thomas who were DEAD as far  
as public spirited interest in their  
town is concerned. There should be  
none of that in a wide-awake city  
like Chatham.

Still, the note of warning should  
be sounded. When there is some-  
thing to do, there is nothing sure  
about it until it is done, and done  
right. There is in this case a cer-  
tain vote required, and the new fac-  
tory, no matter how good it is, will  
never be sure to come until that  
vote is polled.

#### BOARD OF TRADE INTERESTED.

It is with a great deal of pleas-  
ure and satisfaction that it is not-  
ed that the Board of Trade is out work-  
ing in a noble manner. It will not  
be their fault if the by-law is de-  
feated, and in fact it is hard to think  
of defeat with such an able, influen-  
tial and public spirited body of men  
in the field. It is up to every citi-  
zen to feel the personal responsibil-  
ity as keenly as does every member  
of the Board of Trade. The Maple  
City should show that she is filled  
with active, wide-awake men, who  
are doing all in their power to pro-  
mote their own and the city's in-  
terests.

#### THE MEETING ON TUESDAY.

Mayor Stone has called a public  
meeting for next Tuesday evening, in  
the I. O. O. F. auditorium, when the  
matter of the by-law will be gone  
into fully, by men who are perfect-  
ly conversant with its clauses. At

come and become enlightened as to  
every feature of the new proposition.  
The meeting will be thrown open for  
questions; in fact anyone who is in  
doubt about anything in connection  
with the by-law is invited to take  
part in the discussions, and the  
speakers of the evening will do their  
best to explain every detail. There  
is one thing: The proposition will  
grow in public favor the more it is  
explained and looked into.

### PURIFICATION STATION ON WELLINGTON ST.

The Volcanic Oil and Gas Com-  
pany's natural gas purification plant  
will be situated on part lot 73, Wel-  
lington street. Yesterday the com-  
pany closed the deal for the prop-  
erty with the Hadley Lumber Com-  
pany. The site is situated adjacent  
to Hadley's lumber yards.

The plant will be known as the  
eastern purification station, and the  
building on the property will be re-  
modelled and fitted up as perma-  
nent offices for the Volcanic Com-  
pany. The Inquois Pipe Line Com-  
pany will also have offices in the  
building.
