Victoria's Jubilee.

Perhaps no event of modern times has more thoroughly stirred the sentiments of the British people than the jubilee which has rendered the 22d day of June, 1897, memorable in history.

It is often thought that in these days of such complete democracy, little depends upon the personal character or ability of England's sovereign.

A good sovereign therefore is truly a great boon to the nation and how much Great Britain owes to the greatness of her noble queen it is impossible to estimate.

There are relics not only of the French, but of the early settlers, scattered over the province, that should be secured at home, but are fast passing over the line.

How Wolfvillians Celebrated the Queen's Jubilee Day.

A few spent the day in London, some were in Halifax, others went to Annapolis, but Canning drew by far the greater number of our residents who went outside the town limits to do their celebrating.

No. 9, on invitation of the committee having the Canning celebration in charge, went to that town and participated in the exercises. They were the recipients of many compliments for the highly creditable manner in which their work was performed.

The first of their duties was the firing of a "feu de joie" between every seven guns of the "royal salute" of twenty-one guns.

The Canning fire brigade, drawn by four handsome gray horses, Kentville brass band, Forsters, and two or three hundred school children formed up, and were joined by No. 9. Adjutant Northup, of the 68th Bat., mounted on the procession, and right well he performed his task.

After marching around the square a couple of times, during which each member of the Company estimated that he swallowed about four pounds of seal estate, the procession was marched into the school ground, and there dismissed.

That portion of the school ground which took place on the school ground, were then gone on with. The Wolfville entries for these events after getting two or three inches of dust deposited from their brawny limbs, donned their war paint, and proceeded to the arena, but on arriving they found that one of the events in which they intended to compete had been pulled off, and the other was just being fished up.

In the shot-putting contest Sgt. D'Almeida won second prize. The sprints and bicycle races were held on the main street. Both the 100 yd and 220 yd dashes were won in fine style by W. W. Conrad, of No. 9.

After the sports were over, the Company was divided, and one detachment under the command of Capt. Naylor, made an attack on the Waverly House, leaving the ladies in a most pathetic condition.

The other half of the Company under the direction of Lieut. Stary, besieged the Canning House.
