Oars for the Navy.

All the wood used in making oars for the British navy comes from British Columbia. An admiralty order was recently placed with a Canadian lumber company for 200,000 feet of white spruce to be used entirely for this purpose. The fact that the British Columbian white spruce is the wood best adapted for oar-making has been known to the navy for a good many years. Its supreme excellence in this direction was first discovered by the men of the North Pacific Station, who happened to use it for that purpose, and since then the oars for the whole navy have come from Canada. The timber growing on the Queen Charlotte Islands, lying just off the coast of British Columbia, is of especially good quality, and it is from this part of the province that the supply of wood for the navy's oars is drawn.

Auto Trade.

It is estimated that fully 25 per cent. of the automobiles exported by manufacturers in the United States is shipped to Canada. Thirty-two hundred and seven machines were bought in the States in 1921 and it is expected that more than 5,000 will come in this year. The average value of cars shipped in the Dominion by American manufacturers was \$1,887. English manufacturers shipped 240 cars of an average value of \$1,339, to Canada last year.

The foregoing figures do not include tires and accessories. Canadian manufacturers and American builders assembling cars in Canada also report increases in business, saying they have no difficulty in disposing of any vehicle that comes up to the mark.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may pre-empt a purchased quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

IN BRITISH POLITICS

The Rise of New Men is a Striking Feature of Late

The most striking feature of the political life of late years has been the rise of the new men, such as Colonel Reely, Sir Rufus Isaacs, Sir John Simon, Mr. Runciman, Mr. Montagu, who have scarcely made their mark before 1914. Sir Rufus Isaacs came into parliament eight years ago with a weight of the largest practice at the Common Law Bar behind him; he has gone outside the path of the successful politician, lawyer and show a comprehensive grasp of affairs beyond the legal range and a special aptitude for industrial problems. No less noticeable is the rise of the new law officer. Sir John Simon entered the House of Commons in 1906. A young stuff government almost immediately came to power. He was a K.C. at thirty-seven, and to-day many people think that he can make his choice between becoming even a Lord Chancellor, if he sticks to his profession, or Prime Minister if he abandons it. He possesses the most valuable of all qualities in English politics—the capacity for inspiring confidence.

Colonel Reely is another of the new men who is both popular and respected, and there is a general feeling that if anybody can put the military target straight this fresh-faced, tall, blond soldier will do it. At present, if he fails it will be from an want of resolution and unshinishing devotion to the task. Mr. Montagu and Mr. Runciman have yet to 'arrive.' Both have done well enough as Under Secretaries to establish their title to 'Cabinet rank.' Mr. Runciman has made his claim good already, though he has not quite fulfilled the promise of his parliamentary adolescence.

It is from this group of lawyers and laymen, most of them nearly unknown seven years ago, that the future leaders of Liberalism will be drawn. They are young, able, well-informed, industrious, professional politicians in the main interest in life, but so placed as to be independent of the material rewards of office. A Liberal Cabinet which includes them will have a prestige and a capable staff. It will be one in which the Jewish and Celtic elements will be largely represented. "You will have to be a Jew or a Welshman to get into a Liberal cabinet soon," growled a Conservative member in the Lobby. "These young Liberals will have to be both Jewish and lucky, and if they are quietly sliding into the places of our seniors they will change will be to the disadvantage of their party or the nation. For on thing, they are as a body Liberals of distinctly moderate tinge, distrustful of revolutionary legislation and hard-headed experiments, and God bless them and Home Rulers as they are, they seem rather more likely than the predecessors to act with caution and a keen eye and spirit abroad—London Daily Mail.

A RACE PIONEER

Resident of Kenora Traversed West Nearly Seven Decades Ago

It is sixty-six years since Mr. R. J. M. Fisher, Kenora's first settler, who is now approaching the eighty-seventh milestone of life, first sighted the spot where Kenora now stands. He was then but twenty-one years of age and was taking the trip in the interest of the Hudson Bay Company, with whom he had formed a close connection. Accompanied by a small brigade composed of white men, half-breeds and Indians, the party was made from Lac Seul, Que. on May 19th, 1856, en route to Fort Victoria, Hudson Bay. Gaining this point, they rested for some time, and then started on their way up the Saskatchewan River to Edmonton before making the return journey, which was completed in Lac Seul in September of the year. At the Hudson's Bay fort at Fort William the party travelled overland to Wapiti. Fort Frances stands there down the Rainy River and through the Lake of the Woods and Winnipeg River to Lake Winnipeg.

CONSERVING FISH SUPPLY

Canada Interested in Investigation of Fishing by Steam Trawlers

The Government of Canada, Newfoundland, and the United States will conduct an investigation into the effects of steam trawling on the adjacent ocean fisheries. This destructive method of fishing has ruined many important fisheries off the British and European coasts, but there seems to be little hope of preventive measures owing to the recognized freedom of the high seas beyond each nation's three-mile limit. The most serious menace to the fish supply is the use of steam trawlers in the Atlantic. These trawlers are about ten knots an hour, haul a gigantic purse net along the bottom by two wire cables, one from either side, a series of boards is so fastened on each cable as to strike the water at an angle and spread the net. The strain on the wires tells when the purse of the net is full, and it is then hauled aboard. The securing of the net's head applied over the net, the net is an indescribable mess. All kinds and sizes of fish, seaweeds, weeds, and the varied forms of marine life are heaped and matted together.

MAY REVOLUTIONIZE OYSTER FARMING

One of the most important discoveries that has ever been made with respect to oyster culture is the discovery of the first time to the Commission on Fisheries of the Committee of Conservation, Dr. Joseph Bradford of McGill University, who made the discovery as the result of many years' close and intensive investigation.
