WORKS AS PAINTER DURING VACATION

A Centreville Student Adapts Himself to Any Task

Spencer, June 15.—Blake Jameson, one of the promising students of the Bethel Bible Institute, is a master hand at working his own way, as well as getting a first-class education, which he is out for. Mr. Jameson has been in the institute since Nov. 15, 1921. His home is in Centreville, Carleton County, N. B. He left school at the age of 14 years and began working on farms. He says:

"I had given up all hopes of getting an education until the Rev. Essek W. Kenyon arrived in my town to hold evangelistic meetings, and through his excellent teaching I saw the need of an education and through his generous offer I was accepted as a student at Bethel Bible Institute. It is my earnest desire to get a Christian education and to carry the glad tidings that were carried to me to others who are in need. I owe a debt to Bethel and its teachers which I can never repay."

With the institute sessions closed for the summer, Mr. Jameson has gone to work painting for Hiram Willey, one of the trustees of the institute, who is an expert interior decorator, as well as an accomplished painter. Mr. Jameson will work for him for a fortnight before going to Dudley. He worked painting practically all last summer for Mr. Willey.

He will go to Dudley about the first of July to help carry on the work on the new property of the institute there during the vacation and will begin his studies in the new Dudley Bible Institute (the new home for the Bethel Institute) in the fall.

Mr. Jameson has greatly won the confidence of all with whom he has come in contact with his quiet, dignified manner and great desire for study. He recently was able to obtain quite a little library of his own at a trifling cost, but needs many more books, which he hopes to gradually secure.
