Mixed train No. 244 will leave Centreville at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday for Fredericton. No. 242 will leave Fredericton at 8:45 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday for St. John.

Notice of Legislation

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application will be made to the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick at the next session thereof for the passing of an Act incorporating for the purpose of acquiring and distributing electrical power and energy, under the name of "The Bath, Bristol and Florenceville Hydro Electric District," that part of the Parishes of Kent, Peel, Simonds and Wicklow in the County of Carleton, described as follows:

Beginning on the eastern bank of the Saint John River at a point directly opposite the northwest corner of the Buckwheat Bridge, so called; thence easterly crossing the main highway road and the Canadian Pacific Railway to the Oakland Road; and following the said Oakland Road to a point 100 rods from the said main highway road; thence northerly, maintaining the same distance from said main highway road, through the villages of East Florenceville, Bristol and Bath, to the northern boundary of land occupied by Howard Gibson line to the eastern line of land owned by James Howlett; thence southerly along said line of said Howlett land to the north line of land owned by Alfred Gibson; thence westerly along said line of said Gibson's land to the Saint John River; thence south along the eastern bank of said river to the northern side line of land known as the McMullin farm, now occupied by Harry Smith; thence westerly across the said river to a point where the northern side of the Greenfield Road intersects the western side of the main highway road leading from Florenceville to Andover; thence westerly following said side of said Greenfield Road to a point 500 feet distant from the said main highway road; thence southerly, maintaining the same distance from the said main highway road to the southern side line of land owned by Hedley Jewett; thence easterly following said line of said Jewett land to the Saint John River, and continuing in the same course across said river; and thence southerly along the east bank of said river to the place of beginning.
