PRESERVING FOOD IN CANS.

Very Proportions of the Industry-The

Housekeeper's Store.

An industry in this country which has

grown to enormous proportions is that

of preserving food by canning and

boiling. In 1807 M. Appert, a distin-

guished French chemist, found that or-

ganic substances remained fresh an

indefinite time by being kept from con-

tact with the air. Consequently little use

was made of this invention for many

years, except by sailors. About the year

1826, however, a small local trading

up in this country is canned oysters and

tomatoes. The discovery of gold in Ca-

lifornia gave an impetus to the trade,

and the first great expansion of it was

during the civil war. Since that time

the canned goods trade has advanced

by leaps and bounds until at present there

is a capital of \$11,000,000 invested here

in fruit and vegetable canning alone,

giving employment to 20,000 persons, who

earn yearly \$3,000,000, and turn out of

goods \$20,000,000, leaving a net profit of

about 20 per cent. to the investors.

During the war advantage was taken

by the Union commissariat department

of the economy in bulk and the ease in

transportation of canned goods. Canned

meat was found useful for rations in

forced marches; canned milk was a val-

uable substitute for fresh milk in the

hospitals when the latter could not be

had, and the health of the army was

largely maintained by canned fruits and

vegetables.

AN EXPERT MONEY HANDLER.

Tell What He Knows About Counterfeit

Gold-Various Kinds of "Queers."

"You would be surprised if I should

give you some idea of the kinds of "queer"

coins circulating in this city," said Mr.

William Dickerman, an ex-treasury em-

ployee, but now publisher of The United

States Treasury Counterfeit Detector.

"I will show you the best sample of

"queer" gold and silver coins. Now,

strange to say, there is no first rate coun-

terfeit of the double eagle. There is a

fair counterfeit of the eagle, bearing date

1855. It has a very fine appearance, but

as you see here, when the gold plating is

worn off it leaves the white metal under-

neath exposed. Of the \$5 gold piece

there are several kinds. They are made in

counterfeit. The 1844 counterfeit was as-

sayed and found to contain \$4.47 worth

of gold. Consequently it retained its test

about as well as the genuine. Perhaps

the most dangerous counterfeit \$5 gold-

piece is the one dated 1881 and 1888.

This counterfeit coin failed to pass the

sharp eyes of John H. Vassar, of the

United States Treasury. It was sent to the

United States Mint, and there analyzed.

Its assay value is \$4.43. The reading

and milling are exceedingly well done.

Most of the coin counterfeiters made in

gold, but this one was, without doubt,

struck from a die prepared from what is

known as the "drop" process.

"There are a great number of very

clever counterfeiters of the quarter eagle

or \$2.50 piece. The one bearing the 1853

date is the most dangerous. It contains

only twenty-seven cents' worth of gold,

THE MANUFACTURE OF CRACKERS.

There are but three factories in the

United States in which crackers are ex-

clusively manufactured, one each in Bos-

ton, Philadelphia and New York. The

crackers which meet with the greatest

sale are those with elastic type, which are

generally made of rye-meal, which is

not so much as wheat-meal, and which are

cushioned bottom. They sell for \$13 a

pair. The "cow brand" cracker is made

of a cheap grade of meal with nickel

plated ferrules. The handles are secured

fastened by a wire rivet running through

both sides of the cracker and handles.

This is light, tasty and durable. The

arm rivet and handles are made of black

cherry. This cracker brings \$10 at retail.

Many crackers are made to order, their

price depending upon the material used
