

## GRAND LODGE.

### N. B. GRAND ORANGE LODGE MEETS AT CHATHAM.

Order in Good State—Grand Secretary's Report—Officers.

CHATHAM, N. B., March 11.—The New Brunswick Grand Orange Lodge opened its sixtieth annual session at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening in the Orange Hall, the Grand Master, A. D. Thomas, of Fredericton presiding. There were numerous delegates.

In his address the Grand Master told of the order's prosperity throughout the province and referred to the death of William Johnston, of Ireland, one prominent son of Orangemen.

The Grand Secretary, Mr. Neil J. Morrison, of St. John, submitted a lengthy statement, in which the work of the year was tersely reviewed.

Nine lodges had been instituted during the year, as follows: Sprout No. 10, at Collina, Kings county; Elm Tree, No. 118, at Morantown, Northumberland county; Riverside, No. 117, at Wilson's Beach, Charlotte county; Alexandra, No. 120, at Bloomfield, Carleton county; Coronation, No. 121, at Lorneville, St. John county (west); Quoddy, No. 122, at Cumming's Cove, Charlotte county; Empire, No. 123, at Newcastle, Northumberland county; Dorchester, No. 126, at Dorchester, Westmorland county; and Admiral Nelson, No. 128, at Sussex, Kings county.

Three primary lodges were incorporated during the year: Earle, No. 22, Cole's Island, incorporated May 14; True Blue, No. 90, Chatham, July 23; New Century, No. 107, Moncton, Oct. 15.

From the returns received, the past year had been one of the most successful in the history of the province, there had been many initiations and re-initiations. The statistics showed: Initiated, 550; re-initiated, 82; joined by certificate, 122; withdrawn by certificate, 96; expelled, 8; died, 47, making a total gain for the year of 603 members. The new system of issuing warrants had done much to place the order on a proper basis.

During the year 47 members died. Prominent in the list were three past grand officers of the Grand Lodge: James Kelly, P. G. M.; Rev. S. C. Moore, P. G.; Chaplain; and C. W. Hopkins, Past Deputy Grand Secretary. In summing up and concluding his exhaustive report, the Grand Secretary said the money set aside for propagation work last year had been of material assistance, and he hoped the grant would be renewed. The anniversary of the 12th of July was generally celebrated, and the day had lost none of its old-time enthusiasm in this jurisdiction. The claims of the official organ, the Sentinel newspaper, of Toronto, were brought to the notice of the Grand Lodge, and a better patronage asked for it. In regard to correspondence, the Secretary said it had been very large during the year, and dealt principally with the internal working of the association.

A. J. Armstrong was chairman of the committee: F. M. Sproul, secretary; J. M. Steeves, J. T. Hetherington, Albert M. Corbett, Ben Tucker, D. O. McIntosh, members.

J. W. S. Babbirk, Worshipful Master, of True Blue Lodge, delivered an eloquent address of welcome and was replied to by Grand Master Thomas.

The reports were referred to committees and other routine business transacted.

Grand Lodge reopened at 10 this morning.

The forenoon session was occupied chiefly by considering reports of county masters. The sum of \$50 was appropriated for the Orange orphanage at Picton, Ont., and \$250 for propagation work.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY.

The Grand Secretary, R. W. B. Bro. Neil J. Morrison's report opened with reference to the sixty years' history of the Grand Lodge and its unsullied record and, proceeding said:—

"To-night, we are met again in this northern part of our jurisdiction in the flourishing town of Chatham surrounded by brethren who have proved their devotion to this order, and to whom we owe much for their self-sacrifice of time and money in the upbuilding of our association in these northern countries of our Province; and who can rejoice with us to-day over the great progress made all along the line by our order last year."

Reference was made to the coronation of the King and, then, the report dealt with new Primary Lodges organized during the past year, of which there were ten. Two of these were in Northumberland, viz., Elm Tree, No. 118 at Indian town, and Empire, No. 125 at Newcastle. "Elm Tree" was organized July 2nd by R. M. Grindley, County Master, and R. W. Bro. Henry Wyse, Jr. D. G. M., and others and now returns 31 members. "Empire" was organized Dec. 17th, by Henry Wyse, Jr. D. G. M. and others. This lodge is reported as having a bright future in store for it.

Three primary lodges have been incorporated during the year under the general Act, including True Blue, of Chatham.

Reference was next made to the new system of issuing warrants; to visitations, deaths, sales of supplies; propagation work, 12th July celebrations, "The Sentinel," correspondence, etc., and the concluding portion was congratulatory over the Order's prosperity, which was an incentive to continued effort for its further upbuilding.
