(Continued from page 1.) waterworks yards and the committee decided that new shops were badly needed. The aldermen, the chief and secretary James occupied a box at the Savoy in the evening.

The Cemetery Board failed to get a quorum for the meeting called for last evening. The financial statement for January showed receipts of \$3,380, less \$1,135.20, for the perpetual care fund and an expenditure of \$2,908. Receipts for the corresponding month a year ago amounted to \$2,663.45.

John O'Connor, a son of Conductor O'Connor, of the Grand Trunk, is the latest smallpox victim. This is a case that the health department has had under suspicion for some days and this morning, Dr. Roberts, the Medical Health Officer, pronounced it smallpox. Mr. O'Connor has been removed to the isolation hospital.

The Parks Board met this afternoon to organize. Building Inspector Anderson is off duty with an attack of grip.

Engineer Barrow went to Toronto this afternoon to interview Government Engineer Sing about continuing the sewers through the reclamation wall.

T. W. Symmons, one of the engineers of the Dominion Railway Board, was to have come here to-day in connection with the question of protection for the crossing at Barton street and Ferguson avenue, but he failed to arrive. He is expected later in the week. The city hopes to escape without having to pay any of the cost of gates, which it is expected the Railway Board will order erected.

Miss Lewis has presented statements to the trustees of the Sick Children's Hospital fund showing her share of the receipts for the first week to have been \$372.80 and for the second week \$491.52. The theatre receives 60 per cent, and Miss Lewis 40 per cent. Miss Lewis has deposited over \$2,000 in the bank to the credit of the fund.

The meeting called for to-day in the Mayor's office to consider the proposition to buy the old Central Church property for a public auditorium was postponed until a week from to-day.

The Markets Committee is making its annual inspection to-day.

The city has not received the Street Railway Company's proposition yet, and as Colonel Gibson is still busy with the Radial bill at Ottawa, and has informed the city that he desires to attend the meeting when the matter is taken up, it is not likely that a meeting will be held to-morrow.

NO FAILURES.

Windsor in Good Shape and Looks For More Factories.

Windsor, Ont., Feb. 12.—The annual meeting of the Windsor Board of Trade was held last night. In his address President Smyth referred to the absence of any failures in this city during the stringency as an indication of Windsor prosperity, and expressed the opinion that a number of manufacturers would soon locate branches here.

OVERHOLDING TENANT CASE.

Judge Monck heard the evidence in the case of George Walker and Luigi Negro vs. Joshua Wheeler, all of Beverly Township, on the overholding tenant's act, to-day. Walker owns a 42-acre farm in the township, and for the past ten years he has rented it to Wheeler. Last spring he sold the property to Negro, and gave notice to Wheeler to vacate. The latter declined to do so, claiming that he had a yearly agreement, and that they should have given him six months' notice. Judge Monck reserved his decision. John G. Farmer for the plaintiffs, and W. A. Logic for the defendant.

REMANETS DISPOSED OF

Judge Snider disposed of the remaining cases on the County Court list yesterday afternoon. He gave judgment in the Duncan Lithographing Co. vs. Telfer Bros., Limited, of Collingwood, for \$129.73 for the plaintiff company. The action was over the making of labels for the Telfer Bros. in Pilgrim vs. the Wentworth Mineral Water Co. the plaintiff was given judgment for \$199.05. W. A. Logic for the plaintiff, and J. L. Connors for the defendants. The action of Stony vs. Copp was dismissed.


