Mrs. Vye lived a beautiful life and was a thoughtful and sacrificing mother and a true christian. Her greatest pleasure was in doing for others and her loss will be deeply felt in the home as well as the whole community.

She is survived by her husband, the popular veteran official of the C. G. R. and two daughters, Mrs. Arch Alcorn and Miss Enda Vye at home. Also four grandchildren who have made their home with her since the death of their mother. Mrs. Vye's daughter Mrs. Johnson who died three years ago. The late Mrs. Vye was the last surviving member of a well known family of New Glasgow, N. S. characterized by the deep sympathy with the work of the church and by remarkable generosity. Her father the late James Fraser "Downie" was for a time a member of Provincial legislature. The death of Mrs. Vye makes the third death of the family within a short time. Her two brothers having died recently. The late Dr. Fraser "Downie" of New Glasgow, N. S. was also a brother.

The funeral services were held on the Friday afternoon following, from the house in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and was very largely attended, numbers coming from a distance to show their respect and sympathy. The choir led the service of praise which consisted of three of the favorite hymns of the deceased. "God is in the Arms of Jesus," "God is Love," "How firm a foundation," Rev. G. A. Grant officiated. NEWCASTLE SOCIAL SERVICE COUNCIL

The Newcastle Social Service Council, held a special meeting in the Police Magistrate's room last night. The President, Rev. L. H. MacLean occupied the chair, and others present were Fred E. Locke, Sec'y, John H. Ashford, J. Robinson Allison, H. H. Stuart, Mrs. J. D. Seale, Mrs. L. H. MacLean, Mrs. W. D. Hubbard, Mrs. H. S. Leary, and Mrs. John McCormack.

A letter from the Police Inspector, Rev. W. D. Wilson, was read stating that a magistrate's inspector, was being sent to Newcastle, to act until a permanent appointment was made, which appointment would be made as soon as a suitable person could be obtained.

No answer from the Police Magistrate re the small boy confined to jail, or from the Inspector of Trustees, re. having school rooms open earlier in the morning has been received.

The Sec'y stated that he was promised by Warden Burchill to look in to the matter of building a fence around the jail property.

It was resolved to enter a protest to the Town Council against the proposed re-enactment of the by-law, which re-enactment would increase the license fee for dances.

On motion of Rev. L. H. MacLean and John H. Ashford it was resolved to send letters to the Premier, Leader of the Opposition, and the local representative at Ottawa, asking them to exert all their influence for legislation to prevent the manufacture and importation of intoxicants.

A Resolution asking the Local Government to stop the sale for beverage purposes, of all extracts was passed unanimously.

It was decided by the manager of the Opera House to begin the performance in time to close not later than ten o'clock, so the children present would not be late.

After a discussion on the Canadian Censorship of "Archie Meek's" temperance book, which will be dealt with at the next meeting the meeting adjourned.
