Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions: by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of immediately homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader, if good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time relative to a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase of homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on the homestead and erect a house worth \$200.00.

The Holy Father On Evil Language.

On a recent Sunday, His Holiness received in collective audience the Society of La Vergine della Valle, which is also a league against blasphemy, cursing and unclean talk. An address was read by Father Flando, to which the Holy Father replied as follows: Solemn feasts have been celebrated this year in the distant diocese of Catamarca to commemorate the jubilee of the crowning with a golden diadem of the image of the ever Blessed Virgin. The feast was observed as Our Lady of the Valley. And the society erected under the same title here in Rome in the Church of St. Antonio in Via Merulana lost no time in expressing to us the desire to be received in special audience so as not to be left without that blessing which Our Legate to the Argentine Republic was charged to impart in our name to the faithful of Catamarca. The season of the year, which caused the absence from Rome of many of our children, persuaded us of the advisability of deferring the fulfillment of the desire expressed to us.

But now there is a new reason added to the happy motive which induces us to invite to our presence the members of the society of the ever Blessed Virgin of the Valley, a reason quite as urgent though as painful as the other motive is sweet and joyful. For the beloved sodality which is canonically erected under the protection of the ever Blessed Virgin of the Valley has for its aim to combat blasphemy, cursing and unclean talk. It is only a few weeks since we were horrified at the news that terrible blasphemies had been launched against the adorable Person of Our Divine Redeemer by one who poses falsely as representative of the "Popolo d'Italia."

We have, therefore, a double motive for rejoicing at finding ourselves surrounded today by the representatives of the society of the ever Blessed Virgin of the Valley, the first a joyful motive in that it affords us a share in the jubilation which the feasts of Catamarca have produced in those who have been privileged to celebrate together the jubilee of the devotion in its distant home and at the same time its inauguration here in Rome. The other motive, on the contrary, is a supremely sad one, for it is based on execrable acts which demand that we stimulate the members of the pious society to fresh zeal in promoting the works corresponding to the scope of their sodality. Insults inflicted on a friend naturally strike upon our own heart, and how much more true is this when the friend is also a benefactor! We were to remain dumb and insensible in face of the insults inflicted on a friend and benefactor, it could only be said of us that our friendship is not genuine and that our hearts are void of that sense of gratitude which is not unknown even to the brutes. But was not a friend's heart wounded, was not our supreme benefactor offended by those blasphemies launched against our Divine Redeemer? All Christians must have felt outraged by them, because a person who loves takes as done to himself the injury done to a friend, and he who is not ungrateful is afflicted when insult instead of homage is heaped on his benefactor.

But you, of all others, who are enrolled in a league against blasphemy, cursing and unclean talk, must have been specially shocked. Your sodality is of a nature to make you fulfill your duty of reparation to your outraged Lord. For that reason we would wish that the faithful of Rome give their names in great numbers to this Holy League and that they vie in noble rivalry among themselves in offering Jesus prayers and pious ejaculations, notifications and other acts of devotion in reparation for the outrages which blasphemous Lead, S. D., Rt. Rev. Jeremiah J. Seawells and Henry G. Kemp, a cousin of Miss Seawells.

And St. Joseph, too, such a good man, worked stidly at the carpenter trade when he lived down here; and was such a kind father to Jesus. Then, there's our Mother's folks, and—all the dear Saints—oh, I couldn't begin to tell you, there's such a big family of us. Then there's John, my husband, and the children; they live with Father, too; I'm just stayin' on here temporary like, till my Father sends for me, then I'm going Home, too—an' such a time we will have—I expect we will be so glad to see one another, we'll all want to talk at once."

The dear old saint seemed to fall into a blissful dream; and I knew she was seeing through the eyes of faith, that meeting with loved ones in her Father's Home. As I stole softly away, these words came to me: "Verily, I say unto you, whoever shall not receive the Kingdom of God as a little child, shall in nowise enter therein"—(St. Luke 18:17).
