Burin Election Campaign.

This morning in the News, Sir Edward Morris, took a whole page to make clear that he has suddenly become alive to the pressing needs of the Burin District. Before the General Election of 1908 he was apparently unaware that a railway branch would be a source of benefit to Burin, Mortier Bay, Lamaline, Grand Bank and Fortune. He was also utterly oblivious of its desirability when he made the railway contract with the Reid-Newfoundland Company in the fall of 1909, and it was not even considered of sufficient importance to make provision for it in the spring of 1909, when the Branch Railway Act was passed and the Loan Bill put through the Legislature. Last session also went by without any discovery of the need of this special line of policy. But, verily, a change has come over the scene. A vacancy has occurred in the representation of the District, and the Premier of a sudden realized that an engagement which he could put off last year must no longer be postponed. He hurried off to Burin District and dilated there on the utter neglect which had been their fate in the past. He explained that a period must be brought to that

apathy. Government work must hum. Roads over which grass had grown the past two years must be put straight. He himself had reformed his views and revised his railway policy. In the future, say after next General Election, Burin District must be brought within the sphere of branch railway industry. Palace cars would run through the district and the Burin electors be brought within the fold. We congratulate the Premier on his quick conversion and on his speedy amendment of his railway policy in view of the vacancy which has recently occurred in the representation of the district. We notice, however, that the Premier did not think it politic to divulge the date of the bye-election. We notice, however, that he intends to make Government work hum this summer and to take up the election campaign again in July on his return from his picnic to England.

SEALERS OUT BY TRAIN.—The Conception Bay men who were in the S. S. Beothic and S. S. Viking will return home by this evening's train—a special—at 5 o'clock.

HAD HARD TIME.—About 50 horses left Broad Cove for the city this morning and the men who owned them had to shovel a path through the drifts. They had to cross Healey's Pond, two horses fell through and were only rescued after much trouble.

KITE IN SEALS.—Yesterday afternoon Messrs. Bowring Bros. had this message from Camille Delaney, of Horse Harbor:—"Reported steamer about 10 miles north of here in schools of seals." This leads to the hope that the Kite, the only steamer now in the Gulf, will have a good trip of fat.

QUARANTINED SEALERS DIS-SATISFIED.—This morning the sealers of the Newfoundland, quarantined on the South Side, when offered the same food as they had on the ship, refused to take it and asked for something better. The matter was referred to the Government, and the outcome we understand is that a shed will be built down at Port William, it is said, and the men will be housed in it.

Here and There.

DIED AT HOSPITAL.—A woman at the General Hospital who went under an operation for appendicitis died there this morning.

HERRING AT LARK HILL.—Lark H. to-day reports herring plentiful and good catches made there this morning.

DIE THIS EVENING.—The Labrador, from Channel, passed Gallantry Head, St. Pierre, at 2 p.m. yesterday and is due here this evening.

SEALERS AT FIRE HALL.—Sixteen sealers of the Newfoundland who had been let off quarantine were given shelter at the West End Fire Hall last night. This morning 40 more were sent there.

REPORTED MEN QUIT.—It was reported about the city to-day that several men of the 50 who left here with Mr. M. F. Carroll to go to Vancouver left him at Montreal. The story, however, cannot be verified.

STOLE BUTTER AND MEAT.—At 4 o'clock yesterday morning Const. Martin arrested a man named Walsh, of Prince's Street, for stealing a tub of butter weighing 20 lbs. and a piece of meat from the Gloucester Tuesday afternoon. The watchman saw him take the tub and the pleaded guilty in court to-day and was remanded for 8 days to await the arrest of others implicated in the theft.

HOLY WEEK SERVICES.—Thursday night His Grace the Archbishop preached a beautiful sermon on the Blessed Eucharist. Yesterday morning there was Mass of the Presanctified, the Archbishop being the celebrant. At 3 p.m. there was Stations of the Cross. At 7.30 p.m. the service of Tenebrae began, after which His Grace the Archbishop ascended the pulpit and preached a touching sermon on the "Seven last words."

SNOWBALLING DANGER.—Mrs. Hynes, an aged resident of Duckworth Street, was sitting in her parlor yesterday afternoon when a snowball thrown by one of several boys near went with great force through the glass, particles of which entered her eyes, which were so badly cut that Dr. Cowperthwaite, who visited her, fears she may lose the sight of one eye. The matter has been reported to Sgt. Mackey, who is prosecuting the case.
