Last Night's Hockey Match.

VICTORIAS DEFEAT ST. BON'S.
The hockey match of last night between the Victorias and St. Bon's teams resulted in a victory for the former by 7 goals to 3. Despite the storm raging there was a goodly attendance of spectators, but the game was not as fast as many others witnessed in the rink from the same teams heretofore. The line-up was: St. Bon's—S. Walsh, goal; Hearn, point; Golden, cover; Thompson, rover; Collins, right; D. Walsh, centre; Shortall, left.

When the referee's whistle opened the game the Victorias were quickly in St. Bon's territory and in four minutes McPherson, for Vics., secured first blood. Five minutes later Collins, for St. Bon's, equalized. Soon after Bulley on a pass from Shortall notched up the second for Vics., when a few minutes later Thompson equalized. Parsons and Bulley now put up nice combination play, but Hearn prevented their scoring. The Vics. now began a fast pace and Walsh was kept busy. He cleared cleverly, when Bulley, taking advantage of an opportunity, sent in No. 3 for Vics., and less than a minute later McPherson found the net for the fourth time. Both teams now played a fast game and Collins sent the disc in, but it having gone through a hole in the side the shot did not count. When the rubber was again put in play, Shortall neatly passed to Walsh, who sent in No. 3 for St. Bon's. Soon after the teams crossed—Vics., 4 goals; St. Bon's, 3.
SECOND HALF.
When this half opened the Vics. took a run but were blocked, when after Golden did some excellent work the Vics. put on steam and but for the splendid goal tending of Walsh would have scored many goals. Some splendid individual play was noticeable and Walsh saved a difficult shot sent in by McPherson, who was only a few feet distant. The Vics. were now constantly on their opponents' goal, when after about 14 minutes of this half R. Shortall, who did very clever work, sent in No. 5 for the Vics., and in a comparatively short time the Vics., through McPherson, took the 6th and 7th goal, the Vics. being the winners.
