Obituary.

HENRY BARRETT.

We note with regret the death of Mr. Henry Barrett which sad event occurred yesterday afternoon after a brief illness. Deceased was twenty-one years old and the son of Mr. Simeon Barrett. "Harry," familiarly called, was a favourite among his associates in the East End, and for eight years worked in the grocery stores of Mr. E. J. Horwood. He was a prominent oarsman and one of the crew who made the record amateur time in the Blue Peter. Besides his parents, two brothers and a sister, a number of relatives and friends are left to mourn and to whom the Telegram extends sympathy.

Mr. James Murphy, of Witless Bay, died on Monday, July 29th, at the advanced age of 96 years. Deceased was a native of Ireland and came to Newfoundland when quite a young man, and carried on a fishery business and farming. He was very popular with young and old, and up to a couple of months before his death, he could read the daily papers without glasses. His funeral took place on July 31st, and was the largest seen in Witless Bay for a long time. He was buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, the Very Rev. Dean Roache reading the burial services.

Children Cause a Fire.

Yesterday the Central Fire Company was called to Cabot Street where a fire was in progress in a house owned by a man named Martin. The fire was caused by children who were seen lighting matches and paper at the rear of the building. The wood work quickly ignited and a blaze followed. Before any damage worth while was done a stream of water from the chemical quenched the fire.
