#### Our War Session.

For the first time in its history the Newfoundland Legislature meets today for a war session. At three o'clock this afternoon His Excellency the Governor will deliver the Speech from the Throne. The motion for an Address in Reply will be moved in the Legislative Council by the Hon. Edgar Browning and seconded by the Hon. S. Milley, and in the Assembly by Mr. Devereaux and Mr. Le Feuvre. The legislation we understand will be mainly confined to what is necessary to meet the situation which exists today, largely in consequence of the war. The legislation which has been found necessary in the case of Britain and Canada will of course be followed here. Both countries have found it necessary to confer on the Government power to control food supplies, and to take steps to cope with the withholding of food supplies for the purpose of extorting unreasonable profits. Both countries have also found it necessary to take powers to deal with possible runs on banks, and if necessary to proclaim a moratorium dealing with any actual situation which may arise. As a Volunteer Corps is being raised and there is no legislative authority to enrol it, or to swear in its members, or to provide for its upkeep and discipline, suitable legislation must be introduced. There are other questions connected with the holding of suspects, spies and censorship which have been provided for elsewhere and which should be provided for here.

We understand there will be a united effort to enable Newfoundland to do her part in the war crisis. The Opposition reserve to themselves the right of full criticism of the financial proposals and expenditures of the Government which are not due to the war situation, but they have no wish to hamper the Government in any proposals they may deem right, with their fuller knowledge of the situation, to enable Newfoundland to live up to the standing of a Dominion of the Empire. The war session will not be a party session, it will be a truly national one.

#### Bro. Ryan Returning.

We are pleased to learn that Rev. Bro. E. Ryan who was for so many years associated with Mount St. Francis as Principal, and teacher in the Christian Brothers schools, this city, is returning by the R. M. S. Pomeranian which left Liverpool on Saturday last. Bro. Ryan, it will be remembered left here a few years ago for Ireland because of failing health, but has since grown quite strong again. His many friends in the city, particularly his old pupils with whom he spent so many happy years will be pleased to see him back amongst them again.

No definite plans of collection have been arranged up to the present. All subscriptions will be voluntary, and every sum, however small, will be greatly appreciated. The Committee hope that patriotic women will be found to launch branches of the Association in every section of the island. Regarding the work to be done, uniformity will be essential in quality and make. All information in relation to this matter will be given shortly. The articles that are necessary have been ordered. So as persons will be able to form an opinion of what is wanted the following will serve as a guide:—

SHIRTS, DAY (Cotton or Flannel).—Size 15, 16 and 17 inches neck measurement. These should be made to the pattern of a man's ordinary shirt, and should have the size boldly marked inside the back of the collar in red worsted.

BED JACKETS.—Patterns of these will be supplied on information.

PYJAMA SLEEPING SUITS.—These should be made of thin flannel, Ceylon, or best quality non-inflammable flannelette. The most useful sizes are: Chest 46 and 48 inches; waist, 42 and 48 inches; length of jacket from back of neck, not counting collar, 38 to 42 inches; length of leg outside, 40 and 42 inches, inside 38 and 40 inches. These sizes should be distinguished by the chest measurement being worked in a distinct color of worsted inside the back of the collar. Complete suits to be tied together.

DRESSING GOWNS.—These should be made of light and warm wool material, the most useful sizes being 42 and 44 chest measurement and the length from the back of the neck from 55 to 58 inches. These sizes should be distinguished by the chest measurement and length being worked in red worsted inside the back of the neck, thus:—42-55.

PILLOWS.—These should be made of calico or tick 25 inches in length and 17 inches in width, and stuffed with soft material.

PILLOW SLIPS.—These should be made of cotton; a good plan is to make them a quarter yard longer than the pillow, and without buttons or tapes.

BANDAGES.—Many tail bandages, triangular bandages, and T. bandages directions to make which can be given by any trained nurse, will be useful. Roller bandages should be made of calico previously boiled, 2, 2½ or 3 inches wide, 6 yards long; a few 4 and 6 inches wide will be required. Tight rolling is essential and is best done with a bandage binder.

Old linen is very valuable, and there must be quantities of it in the presses of the matrons of Newfoundland.

#### Musketry Practice.

The camps to accommodate the volunteers during their three days' rifle practice at the Southside range, have all been erected. The ammunition will be brought there to-day. Tomorrow evening the first squad of 64 will commence practicing at the range. Service rifles from the Calypso will be used pending the arrival of the Ross rifles. These not used to shooting are practicing at the miniature ranges at the various brigade armories. Sergeant Instructor Moore speaks in commendable terms of the recruits.
