The way in which the atmosphere of homes differs, the way one person can affect the atmosphere of a whole household, the happiness that is needlessly lost by living in an unpleasant home atmosphere, are subjects which deeply interest me.

Try To "Get Something" On Each Other.

There are some homes where the housemates are always keen to "get something" on each other, find each other in a mistake, discover something they can blame each other for. I know one in which the man of the house is constantly saying to his wife: "You told me such and such a thing and now I find out it isn't so." Nothing delights him like catching her in some such mistake. She does not hear quickly and thus gets things twisted and one would expect him to pass such things over but instead he always makes the most of them, says "I wish I could be told things right once in awhile," or something to that effect.

He Loves Grievances.

Instead of accepting the thing as a mistake he makes a grievance out of it. He loves grievances. "Simply miss them up" his daughter says. The arrival of supplies of autumn Newfoundland Scotch cured herring on the Str. Florizel and the sale of quantities on the pier establishes the market for this grade in New York at \$15.00. At this figure most of the goods changed hands, and in some cases fancy stock brought up to \$16.50. The remainder of the spring catch which has been offering in the trade is quoted on the general basis of from \$12.00 to \$13.00. The quality of the new fish is not as fancy as that of a year ago, and it is a general opinion among buying factors that the quality of the fish for the entire season will not show the same excellence as that of last year, and therefore prices are not expected to reach a higher level than \$18 at the outside. There is little demand for stocks now held in store.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

The War Week by Week.

There is still more talk of peace than narrative of war, and the summary of the week's operations is a short one. In Roumania the Germans have carried their successes an important and dangerous step further; there are signs of a quite new British and Russian campaign against Turkey in Asia; and on the West front there have been minor events of no very great moment; beyond this little has happened.

Vol Mackensen seems to have broken down the Russian lines before, though not on the Sereth. These lines ran from Focsani in the west to Braila in the east; both places have been taken. The logical results of this enemy victory have followed. The Russians have fallen back upon the river itself and the Germans are now attacking Galatz. They seem bent upon nothing less than an invasion of Bessarabia, for the position they have already won is amply satisfactory for further defensive purposes. If this is their project, it is an ambitious one. Either the Sereth or the Danube (Galatz marks their junction) will have to be forced. The former is a formidable obstacle and will be strongly defended by the Russians; the latter is still worse, being, from Galatz to the Black Sea, nothing but a chain of marshes and great lakes. We read that the Bulgarians have already encountered this difficulty. So far Galatz is being merely bombarded.

This the Germans can easily do with their large guns; it will be another matter to occupy it. A glance at the map will show how strong a natural barrier the line of the two rivers presents to their advance. If it is passed there would seem to be no limits to what the enemy can do in this region. But it has yet to be passed, and unless this is done from Dobruja (an exceedingly unlikely event) the Pruth will still remain to be crossed before Russian territory is reached.

The prediction was recently made in America that the Holy Land was next to be the scene of war: it is well on the way to fulfilment. For long the British have maintained a force in Egypt far larger than merely defensive requirements demanded; they are now using it for other purposes. Last month a very strong Turkish position on the coast, El Arish, was taken by them, about one hundred miles east of Port Said. The significance of the occurrence seems to have been lost in the more engrossing interest of peace talk and other matters. The British have now crossed the border into Turkey and taken Rafah, another seaboard about thirty miles east and north of El Arish and some fifty from Jerusalem. It can hardly be that these movements are designed to make assurance doubly sure against an enemy invasion of Egypt. They synchronise with quite extensive and so far successful operations in Mesopotamia. The map shows the Allies to be operating at the angles of a large triangle, at Erzingan, Rafah and Kutel Amara. It looks like the beginning of an ambitious campaign against Turkey in Asia of which we see only the tentative preliminaries. Continued successes for the British in the Holy Land will have more than a military effect, for religion plays a part here.
