Instant Action Necessary.

The Trade Review, on Saturday, published in its news columns an article which contains a most grave charge against French fishermen operating on the Grand Banks, a charge so serious that we make no apology for reprinting the text in order that cognizance may be taken of the subject by those in authority, and such measures adopted as will prevent any recurrence of marauding whether in territorial waters or on the high seas as alleged. There is such a law in international marine codes that provide penalties and punishments for marine freebooters; and if the proof of the Trade Review's statement can be produced, and there is no reason to believe that it cannot, otherwise that paper would not commit itself to an expression, instant action should be taken to put a stop to a species of brigandage carried out on the high sea. If French steam trawlers in their "wild desire" to get fish, run amok and trespass on the rights, and deliberately destroy the property of other fishermen, without redress being made, then the fishermen so attacked in their legitimate calling will have to protect themselves by adopting stern measures and invoking the aid of the lex talionis. Such depredations as reported cannot be tolerated, nor yet accepted, lying down. An appeal must be first made to those in authority; a protest entered against the lawlessness of French fishermen; an enquiry instituted at once and the closest scrutiny made into the charge as published in our weekly contemporary, and appended at the foot hereof. If Newfoundland fishermen in the pursuit of their avocation, are harassed by Frenchmen on the Banks, an investigation into the matter by competent authorities must be held. If, as alleged, Newfoundland bankers were obliged to abandon the voyage and return home in order to replace gear wantonly destroyed by fishermen of another country, claims for material as well as moral damage must be entered; and if these outrages continue the protection of warships will have to be required of the Imperial Government. Aggressions of the nature of those said to have been made by French fishermen cannot be countenanced, and we accordingly direct the attention of the Newfoundland Government to the article herewith, and request that they take such steps as are justified by the circumstances complained of.

LOCAL GEAR IS DAMAGED.

Newfoundland Fishermen Complain of French on Banks.
Fishermen who returned this week from the Grand Banks report that the French trawlers are playing havoc with the trawls of our fishermen and that it is impossible to set lines of trawls without having them torn up by the French beam trawlers who, since they started out, make

a clean drag regardless of whether they are running foul of other fishermen's trawls or not. Complaints have been made time and time again this season but there seems to be no redress and no satisfaction given by the Frenchmen. The Trade Review's informant says "the Frenchmen were never so keen and are acting like wild men as long as they can get the fish."
Thousands of dollars worth of trawls and moorings were destroyed the past three weeks and in some cases Newfoundland crews had to abandon the voyage and return to their home port to replace their lost gear.

Although the Grand Bank is neutral ground outside the three mile limit, still there should be some representation made to the Home Government in this serious case so as to have an international agreement whereby such injury may not be inflicted on our fishermen and those of other countries who do not use the beam trawl. It is hardly likely that this kind of treatment would be inflicted on United States fishermen with impunity and without redress. There is, therefore, no valid reason why British fishermen should tamely submit to it.

Sir John Crosbie Returns Dean of Nova Scotia

PREACHES IN CITY CHURCHES.

The large congregation present at Mattins in the Anglican Cathedral yesterday had the privilege of hearing a brilliant discourse from the Dean of Nova Scotia, Very Rev. Dr. Liwyd. The Dean took as his text "Platye, quester to the Saviour, 'Art thou a King?" and Jesus answered "Thou sayest that I am." The picture of the Redeemer standing before the Judge deflected, apparently helpless and abandoned, simply thrilled all who were present. The Dean was again heard last evening at St. Thomas's Church by a large congregation. The Rector, Rev. E. C. Harp, on behalf of the Church Warden and congregation, extended a hearty greeting to the distinguished visitor. Dean Liwyd preached on the "Craving of success in prayer," and kept his hearers spell bound for nearly an hour as he gave an exposition of the points, Power, Forethought, Concentration and Reconciliation as applied to prayer. Dr. Liwyd is a very fluent speaker and his enunciation is clear and distinct. His discourses are couched in chaste and scholarly language and his personality is very striking. It was a pleasure to listen to him. Another opportunity to hear Dean Liwyd will be given on Wednesday next at Ewanston, prior to opening of the Diocesan Synod, when he will preach the Synodical Sermon.

The Cabstands.

WILL SOON BE COMPLETED.
The new cabstands are now being locked into shape. Practically all the excavation work has been finished. The stand at the Eastern End of the Post Office is being paved with whinstone from the quarries on the Southside Hill, and the work will finish during the week. The stand at the Western End of the Court House will also be paved. A concrete retaining wall some 10 feet high has been erected and the place, always dilapidated, is putting on a neater appearance. It would be as well if those in charge of the work would have the bank at the back of the wall terraced and grassed. The cost should not amount to much in comparison to the improvement. The stand adjoining Clouston's store is being bottomed for paving. This place is very small and out of all proportion to its cost or usefulness.

Mr. Cotton Coming.

Mr. F. Sidney Cotton will shortly return to St. John's from an extended trip to England in connection with aerial matters and the Humber Bay proposition. Mr. Cotton is coming by ship via Montreal. Mr. Sydney Bennett is at present at Hawke's Bay, superintending the work there. Final arrangements in connection with the Aerial Survey Company's development of that district will probably be made when Mr. Cotton arrives.
