Assassination of Leon Trotsky Reported.

10,000 Dead Counted in Tokio and Yokohama—Conversations Between French Ambassador and Stresemann May Lead to Settlement of Disputes—Italy Will Annex Fiume—Transportation of Canadian Wheat Crop Offers Difficulties.

ITALY TO ANNEX FIUME.

PARIS, Sept. 11.—It is understood that information received from reliable sources that Mussolini will proclaim an annexation of Fiume to Italy within a few days. The Government of Fiume is reported as being aware of Mussolini's intention, and is intending to make no serious protest, provided the Italian Government will not directly affect it.

WILL NOT APPEAL TO LEAGUE.

GENEVA, Sept. 11.—The Yugoslav Minister declared today that his Government had no intention of submitting to the League of Nations its differences with Italy over the Fiume question.

REFUGEES SICK.

OSAKA, Sept. 11.—The Eastern News despatch to the effect that the Japanese Government is reported to have collected a large number of women and children are reported to be lying helpless near the Railway Station unable to obtain the food.

TROTSKY ASSASSINATED!

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Central News despatch from Moscow reports that Leon Trotsky, Russian Soviet leader, has been assassinated. No details are given and there is no confirmation of the report.

LOADING CANADIAN GRAIN CROP.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.—The advent of a heavy crop of wheat from prairies, and the refusal of the United States vessel owners to engage in the Canadian carrying trade under the new Lake Freight Commission requiring them to file tariffs for the Canadian boats on the Great Lakes were ordered by telegraph to report at Fort William or at Arthur next week to engage in loading the 1923 crop to the Eastern States. It was reported here today that the situation is causing considerable anxiety on the part of local wheat and an endeavor now is being made to get the Government to amend the Act so that the United States vessels with participate in the carrying. Canadian vessels can carry about a million bushels a day, while two million bushels will arrive daily at the head of the Lake's.

TYPHOID AND DYSENTERY IN TOKIO.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Typhoid and dysentery have broken out in Tokio and there is great need for medical supplies, says a despatch from the Daily Express, dated Sunday. The epidemic is being witnessed by foreigners and Japanese. A search of the ruins for relief.

70,000 DEAD COUNTED.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The dead counted by the Japanese authorities up to Sept. 7th numbered forty-seven thousand in Tokio and twenty-three thousand in Yokohama. The Foreign Office in Tokio reported to-night to the Japanese Embassy. The message said a hundred and fifty foreigners had died in the quake.

FRANCO-GERMAN CONVERSATIONS.

PARIS, Sept. 11.—Conversations that are taking place between Jacques de Margerie, French Ambassador to Germany, and Chancellor Stresemann in Berlin, are considered by the French Government as leading toward a settlement of the reparations question, although it is stated that the Chancellor has not yet made a definite offer either respecting the cessation of resistance in the Ruhr or what could be proposed afterwards. The conferences between M. de Margerie and Chancellor Stresemann will be continued, and any propositions received by France from Chancellor Stresemann will be communicated immediately to the British and other Allied Governments.

STEAMER ON FIRE REACHES PORT.

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 11.—Fire in the hold of the steamer American was still raging when that vessel arrived here to-night for refuge, while on a voyage from Baltimore to "Frisco. A quarter million dollars worth of damage has been done to the ship and cargo, and thirty firemen were overcome.

CORFU TOOK SETTLEMENT QUIETLY.

CORFU, Sept. 11.—News that both Greece and Italy had accepted the proposals made by the Inter-Allied Council of Ambassadors for settlement of the Graso-Italian dispute was received quietly here and there was no demonstration. There is a tendency among Italian authorities to wonder how long the occupation will continue. Some hazard the opinion evacuation will take place immediately and the forces will be out in fifteen days. Others expect it will take a month or two for Italy to withdraw.

DESIRABLE SETTLERS.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.—An organized effort to retain in Canada as permanent settlers eleven thousand British harvesters brought to Canada will be made at a widely represented conference to be held in Saskatoon on Sept. 20th under the auspices of the Canadian Colonization Association, it was announced last night.

The Mark That

Means Nothing.

The City of Vienna five per cent. bonds, 1922 issue, are too speculative for a Canadian's funds, and as for the offer made to you by A. M. Lincoln & Company of Boston, Mass., under date of August 18th, of German Government 5 per cent. bonds at \$18 per million marks, what freak of folly could induce one to invest in the securities of a Government whose currency is being sold on the New York market at 14 cents to the million marks. Not very many years ago each of those marks was worth 23.3 cents. They have not finished their slide yet. I do not follow the reasoning of the Lincoln letter when he claims that value of this bond can be considered independently of the currency inflation.

Armored Glass.

It is said that a fortune awaits the individual who shall invent a flexible, unbreakable glass. "Armored glass," so called because it contains a netting of galvanized wire and is not easily broken into small pieces, is too heavy and to nearly opaque for most uses. There is a glass of comparatively recent invention called "three ply." Although it is neither flexible nor unbreakable, it has certain advantages over other kinds. It is composed of two panes of glass with a thin sheet of transparent celluloid pressed between them and made to adhere by hydraulic pressure. It is said that a blow hard enough to shatter ordinary glass and to drive the pieces for some distance merely cracks the three ply glass.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

Every person liable to Income Tax shall on or before the thirtieth day of April in each year, without any notice or demand, and any person, whether liable to taxation hereunder or not, upon receipt of a notice or demand in writing from the Commissioner of Taxation, deliver to the Minister a return on oath of his total income during the last preceding year.

All persons to whom Forms have been sent, and who have failed to make a return under this Section, whether liable to taxation or not, and who fails to make such return within the time limited therefore, shall be subject on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten dollars for each day during which the default continues.
