Prof. Koch's Discovery.

Berlin, Nov. 8.—The discovery of Prof. Koch, of the Berlin University, of a method for the cure of consumption by inoculation with attenuated tubercular bacillus, is exciting the greatest interest. It seems probable that a motion will be introduced in the Prussian Diet looking to the establishment of a bacteriological institute, which will be under the direction of Prof. Koch. The private patients under Koch's care belong to the higher aristocracy, and have pledged their word of honor to keep silonee until he releases them from their obligation. From a private source information has come that a consumptive youth, the son of an official at the Hygienic Institute, of which Koch is president, has already been cured. In cases now under treatment a change for the better is observed after five or six injections of lymph, within a fortnight. In one case of long standing it took months to effect an improvement. Before six months all the patients will have passed through the period of observation, and then Prof. Koch will be ready to put the result before the world. He thinks four to eight weeks will be necessary to complete the cure, but slight cases may take less time.

NO HOPE FOR BIRCHALL! The Cabinet Council

And the Sentence of Death Must Be

The Doomed Man Notified by His Wife —He Still Protests that He Did Not Kill Benwell.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 .- In the Birchall cas ts course, so that Birchall will be executed in Woodstock jail yard Nov. 14. The decision of the Cabinet was taken on Wednesday evening, but owing to the intervention of Thanksgiving Day the approval of the Governor-General was not obtained till yesterday afternoon. The Department of Justice have notified the authorities at Woodstock of the decision. It is understood that the Cabinet was unanimous in its judgment, being convinced of Birchall's guilt.

IT WAS EXPECTED.

Woodstock, Nov. S.—The action of the Dominion Government in allowing the law to take its course in the Birchall case was anticipated by nearly every one here, including the prisoner. Mrs. Birchall and Mrs. West-Jones had some hope, however, and when the press dispatch containing the decision of the Cabinet was shown them they were inclined to doubt its accuracy. They did not expect that the decision would be known until Monday or Tuesday of next week. After the press dispatch was received Mrs. Birchall visited her husband in the jail, but did not tell him anything about it. Mr. MacMurchy shortly afterwards received a telegram from the Deputy Minister of Justice stating that it had been decided that the law would have to take its course, and that removed all doubts. Mrs. Birchall returned to the jail and performed the melancholy duty of removing the last hope that her husband may have cherished. Birchall has certainly always said that he did not believe the petition would do any good. Though he does not often show it, he is becoming fully alive to the awful position he is in, and suffers intense mental anguish.
