He thanked the electors for the support given him in the past and hoped it would be extended again on Monday next.

Water Commissioner Essery was given a warm reception. He was there to accept the nomination and defy Ald Jones. The Board was above repreach, like Casan's Jones, if true, required that the water com-missioners should not be there, at if not true it was not a charge that should be made by an Englishman to the son of an Englishman.
