LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mr. Creswell, a member of the Ridge-

town K. of P. Band, intends moving to this city shortly.

—Mr. Faulkner, of this city, has resumed his former place in the Bank of Commerce in St. Charles.

—Rev. Principal Miller, of Huron College, left Monday to attend a meeting in Kingston of the Board of Examiners appointed under the provisions of the canon of the Provincial Synod on divinity degrees.

—Mr. John McCreedy has been appointed his old position as assistant station master of the G. T. R., this city. His friends will be pleased to hear that he has secured it after his accident at Fort Erie.

—The death is announced of Mrs. Margaret Moran, aged 59 years, the sad event occurring at the residence of her son, Mr. James H. Moran, carriage builder. Deceased was one of the oldest residents of the city, and well known and esteemed.

—James Gantley, G. T. R. brakeman, this city, had his hand pinched while coupling cars at Harrisburg last night.

—The city clerk's office has been supplied with new shelves for the accommodation of voters' lists and other papers.

—Mr. Wm. Smith, the well-known plumber, of this city, has left to attend a convention of master plumbers in New York city.

—D. Collins has sold the St. Thomas ice house and property to E. M. Griffin for \$1,800. The London business will be carried on as usual.

—A little boy named Smith was run over at the corner of Richmond and King streets yesterday, passing a rig. He was slightly bruised.

—Mr. and Mrs. Byrne and Miss Lillian Glendinning, city, have arrived at Liverpool. The latter will reside in Cornwall, Eng., for a year.

—Mrs. L. S. Vaughan, formerly of this city, has been presented with an address and purse by the congregation of Christ Church, Selkirk, N. W. T., of whose choir she is organist.

—James W. Maria, proprietor of the Martin House, King street, has assigned. He gives as his reason that he indured too freely and did not refuse when he should have done so.

—The engineer is preparing plans of the whole city with the view of the street intersections to be sent to Mr. Chipman, who will make an estimate of the cost of the proposed sewage system.

—In the police magistrate's private case on Monday afternoon Philip Levi charged Susan Goldstick with using threatening language. The defendant was bound over to keep the peace.

—Christ Church congregation is completing arrangements to build a new school-house, a considerable amount being already subscribed. The building will be brick and will be erected in L shape at the east and south sides of the church.

—As a young lady was walking along Huron street early Monday night, an apology for a man asked to be allowed to walk with her. She refused, and in return received a blow from behind. The coward took to his heels when she screamed for assistance.

He has many friends in London and neighborhood who, while regretting his determination to leave the city, will wish him every success in his new location.

—E. T. Macomb, late organist and choir master of St. James' Church, South London, presided at the pipe organ, which was the new Episcopal Church in Kingston on Sunday, and at an organ recital Monday evening given by him in the church. Some of the leading members were admirably taken by J. W. Belcher, of this city.

—Inspector Bell had a batch of applicants for railway passes recently. Mary Ann Young came from Walkerton with her 5-year-old child to look for employment, but was turned away by the ticket agent, Mr. Stratford. Mrs. Nelson, the support of whom her husband has just been released from by the court, was sent to Eber. Incentive, a fine looking young fellow, has been sent to the workhouse, and was out of work and was given the means to ride to Hamilton.

—The famous Spiritualist Coming.

Annie Eva Fay, the female wonder who has been drawing great crowds in Toronto and American cities, appears at the Grand Opera House Thursday night. This renowned spiritualist was subjected to tests for three months by the Royal Society of London, with the result that distinguished scientists pronounced her illustrations as most marvelous, some claiming occult force, some electricity or magnetism, while still others talk of supernatural power. The Scotsman says that not much over a century ago Miss Fay would have been burnt as a witch, while now she will only puzzle and amuse the many who go to see her. Her performances are certainly wonderful, and of such number and variety that enumeration would be a task.

THE FLOWER SHOW.

The City Hall a Scene of Beauty and Fragrance.

Chrysanthemums take the front rank of beautiful autumn flowers, and their brilliant colors and profuse bloom have made them great favorites. The wonderful advance recently shown in this class of plants is almost marvelous. Many of the varieties are gorgeous in their color and marking, some having flowers that are perfect in form, while others have curious and fantastic-shaped blooms that are novel and extremely beautiful.

Since the beginning of the eleventh century the chrysanthemum has been used as the imperial sign of Japan, and written records give the facts that so far back as the year 880 Corea paid as a tribute to the Emperor Ninoku. The most flourishing period of their culture, however, seems to have been the middle of the eighteenth century.

That our local gardeners are not behind in the culture of these favorites can be proved by the display at the City Hall, where the Florists' and Gardeners' Society have on view a splendid collection of this grand autumn flower. Individual plants being undoubtedly ahead of any in their class ever shown in Canada, both one plant of the glorious variety shown by Messrs. Greenway, of London West, having about 1,000 well-formed flowers.

"Mums" are the leading feature of the show, considerable space has been given to foliage and decorative plants of many varieties, including some fine specimens of graceful and stately palms, banana, yucca, century plants, magnolia, bitter aloes and quantities of roses, carnations and other floral beauties.

The fine display of orchids from New Rochelle, N. Y., will be a great feature of the show, and Londoners, who seldom have the opportunity of seeing these gems of the tropics. The show opened at 2 p.m. yesterday, and will be open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. to-day and to-morrow. Music will be supplied both afternoon and evening, and a large attendance is assured, as such enterprise on the part of the florists is to be commended, and is well worthy of support.

RECIPROCITY AND CARRIAGES.

Ex-Mayor Campbell, who recently returned from a trip to the Pacific coast, has been by an American reporter, who questioned him as to the allegation that the high tax policy alone enabled him to keep his factory going. He replied: If it were not for the tariff, instead of going to the other end of the country to hunt up orders, in addition to my traveling expenses and a month's absence from business, I would have the market at my doors. When the heavy tariff was put on every one started "manufacturing." It's not the mechanic now that manufactures, it's the speculator that invested his money on account of the right away. Prior to this the business was left with mechanics who understood it; now you find doctors, lawyers, and people of every other profession engaged in this so-called manufacturing.

Before the heavy tariff, there were very few foreign carriages put into this market; they were only here after it was imposed, and the Free Press knows this but still it keeps harping on that. If there is any doubt about the matter the editor can refer to the customs house entries, and see that it was the summer after the National Policy introduction that we found a market for them. If we had reciprocity, we would get good prices for good work, but sloppy workmanship will have to be sold at a sacrifice in any country. Can we compete with the States? Certainly we can; and those who can't don't deserve to get anything to do. Free trade cannot injure any legitimate business.

Questioned about the Northwest, Mr. Campbell said the country was all right. Some damage had been done the crops, but the yield was a big one. He thought that the removal of the tariff would benefit that part of the Dominion as well as the Eastern Provinces.

TERSELY TREATED.

News Notes from Here, There and Everywhere.

Edmund Frankish, aged 18, was killed near Peterboro, Ont., on Monday by a runaway team.

During the past year the Montreal Street Railway Company made \$60,261, and will pay an 8 per cent. dividend.

Typhus fever is spreading among the famine-stricken inhabitants of several provinces in the Government of Kazan, Russia.

The insurance losses on the lakes for September and October are estimated at \$465,000. The two months taken together are without precedent.

Members of the committee of associated banks express the opinion that depositors of the Maverick National Bank, Boston, will ultimately get 70 cents on the dollar.

The Clearing House Association, of Boston, has decided to relieve the embarrassment of any depositor in the Maverick National Bank. It was voted to expel the bank from the association.

Asa P. Potter, president, and Col. J. H. French and Thomas Dana, directors of the Maverick National Bank, Boston, have been arrested charged with embezzlement and misappropriation of the funds of the bank.

Dr. Howe, who for 33 years was principal of the Montreal High School, and who on Monday retired from that position, was given a purse containing \$5,000 and an album containing the photographs of the donors, all of them old school boys.

Burglar Charles Schmidt, sentenced to fifteen years in San Quentin prison, California, was placed in his cell. He had secreted morphine in a package and soon after being placed in prison took a large dose and died.

At the meeting of the Young Men's Hebrew Society of Montreal the report showed that they had overdrawn their account by \$8,000 in affording relief during the year. They had to give shelter to 658 families and 1,300 individuals; besides these over 1,000 required support.

The chrysanthemum show under the auspices of the New York Florists' Club, in Madison Square Garden, is the biggest flower show ever held in New York. Notwithstanding that the floor surface measures 30,000 square feet the space is so small. The premiums aggregate \$6,500, besides special prizes.

The creditors of Mr. Samuel Davidson (Toronto) the manufacturer's agent who is out of the country because of customs frauds, was met on Monday. A statement was presented showing \$33,300 of liabilities and assets of \$19,500 nominally. The assets, however, are not now realizable, and 15 cents on the dollar is probably all that is assured.
