UNHAPPY TORONTO.

Her Citizens Will Have to Drink Diluted Sewage

For Months-A Break in the Water Pipe.

Toronto, Sept. 5.-The conduit pipe across the bay went all to pieces this morning, and the citizens of Toronto will have nothing now but dilated sewage drawn from the middle of the bay delivered through the city mains for

months to come. The pipe is in a much worse condition than when it rose in the winter of 1892. It began to come to the surface in Blockhouse Bay about 8 o'clock this morning, and from that hour till 9:30 it kept rising in sections. At the hour stated 200 feet of the pipe rose to the surface directly opposite Hanlan's Point, where the water is very low and particularly foul.

The cause of the accident is not yet determined, but it is supposed to have been due to air getting into the pipe in consequence of the low water.

The water is only about half pressure all over the city, and the health officer has notified the public of the necessity of boiling all water intended for domestic use. The opinion largely prevails that this will necessitate prompt and radical action being taken in improving the waterworks system.
