The Holy See, he added, was never indifferent to the condition of the Armenians, and desired to see the various peoples of Turkey governed on an equality and with equity. The Pope was somewhat exhausted to-wards the end of the consistory, which lasted nearly two hours. Dr. Lapponi, his physician, ordered him to take some cordial. The Portiff's spirits were not impaired, and he asked, smil-ingly, of Cardinal Rampolla, the Papal Secretary of State, "Who knows who will preside at the next consistory."

SURPRISED AT SALISBURY. Vienna, Nov. 30 .- A dispatch to the Politische Correspondenz from Constantiople says that the Sultan and his Ministers were painfully surprised at Lord Salisbury, the British Prime Min-ister, reading the Suitan's message to him at the meeting of the National Conservative Union on Nov. 19. The message was strictly confidential. The Sultan's request that Lord Salisbury deliver another speech presumably meant that he should make a speech that would neutralize the effect of the speech he delivered at the banquet given by the Lord Mayor on Nov. 9, without making any reference to the fact that the Sultan had asked him to do so.

STOLE £100,000 AND ELOPED. As Woodstock is in the center of the oldest and most important dairy district in Canada, and has good railway connections, a large attendance of representative dairymen from all parts of Western Ontario is expected. The official programme will be issued about Considerable interest is being shown

in the dairy show in connection with the Provincial Fat Stock Show at Guelph on Dec. 10, 11 and 12. A large number of special and cash prizes will be given for dairy cows. On the evening of Dec. 10 a joint meeting of dairy, sheep and swine breeders will be held at the city hall, Guelph, when addresses will be delivered by Hon. John Dryden, Prof. Robertson and others.

The secretary of the association recently attended a meeting of cheese factory representatives at Embro to devise some means of promoting more co-operation among factories.
