### DISSOLUTION NOT REQUIRED

Hon. David Mills Discusses the Constitutional Question.

Precedents Established in Great Britain-The Law as It Relates to the Dominion of Canada.

The Toronto Globe publishes an interview had with Hon. David Mills, the minister of justice, in regard to the constitutional questions arising out of the critical illness and probable death of the Queen.

"Does the Queen's death dissolve the British Parliament?" Mr. Mills was

"No, it does not. The act of 1867 put an end to that rule. The ancient practice of the constitution in that regard was founded upon the theory that the House of Commons was called into existence for the purpose of advising the sovereign, and was treated as personal council of the sovereign for the purposes of legislation, the fechnical theory being that all acts of parliament are the acts of the sovereign, created by and with the consent of the two houses of parliament. Seven and eight, William III., Chap. 15, enacted that the parliament should last for six months after the demise of the crown, if it were not sooner dissolved by the new sovereign, and this rule was ap-plied to the united parliament of England and Scotland, and also to Ire-land, when that country was represented in the United Kingdom. Thirty-seven, George III., Chap. 127, provided that where the demise of the sovereign took place during the period of a dissolution, the preceding parliament was to be revived for a period of six months, and the present statute, which is 30 and 31 Victoria, Chap. 102, makes the duration of parliament in-dependent of the demise of the crown.

THE DOMINION LAW. "Our law for the Dominion, which will be found in chapter 11 of the re vised statutes, provides that 'no par liament of Canada, summoned or called by her majesty, or her heirs or successors, shall determine or be dissolv ed by the demise of the crown, but such parliament shall continue, and may meet, convene and sit, proceed and act, notwithstanding such demise of the crown, in the same manner as if such demise had not happened. So that the death of her majesty would not necessarily affect the duration of parliament either in the United King-

dom or in Canada,
"Before the American revolution, in some of the colonies the impression prevailed for a time that the death of the governor would have the effect of dissolving the legislative assembly in the same way that the death of the sovereign would dissolve the House of Comme is, but the law officers of the crown pointed out that this was a wholly erroneous view, that the called together to advise the sovereign. and not the governor, upon the subject of legislation, and so the governor's demise had not the effect of dissolving the legislative assembly. The executive power of the crown extends alike to all parts of the empire, and it was the death of the sovereign, and not the sovereign's representative that terminated the existence of all bodies that advised the crown-whether in respect to legislation or administration-the theory being, as I have already stated, that these bodies were the personal councils of the existing sovereign, and the effect of dissolution being to leave the succeeding monarch equally free to

constitute his own councils. "By a statute passed immediately after the death of George IV. it was expressly stated that no commission or warrant for the exercise of any office or employment, civil or military, within any of her majesty's possessions should in future, on the demise of the crown, become void until the expiration of eighteen calendar months next after such demise. And so all colonial commissions which existed at his demise were continued in force for a period of eighteen calendar months during the period of the fourth George's death, and that continued to be the law until 1867, when the representation act made the duration of parliament independent of the demise of the sovereign."

regency during the time the Queen is prevented from exercising the func-tions of the sovereign?"

"I do not remember that any imperial statute in force at the present time makes provisions for a regency. Unless parliament provided for the appointment of a regent, difficulty might arise in case the ministers decided to perform some executive act that required the royal sanction. During the incapacity of George III. the two houses of parliament were voluntarily in session without royal authority, and were earnestly engaged in the discussion of the subject as to how parliament was to be convoked and the royal functions discharged during the illness of the sovereign. On that occasion a regency bill was enacted, and the powers of the Prince Regent defined. and a commission was sealed for the purpose of giving the royal assent to bills while the incapacity of the king continued. Sir Samuel Romilly pointed out that a power thus exercised practically rested upon the authority of the two houses alone. It was a case of necessity, and it would have been more honest for the two houses. under the circumstances, to invite the Prince Regent to perform the tions during the sovereign's illness."
"Supposing parliament has made no

provision in the present case for the appointment of a regent?" In such an event parliament will either have to recognize the principle of necessity, as was done when James II. fled, or will, if necessary, have to follow the precedent established in the time of George III., and subsequently ask for a bill of indemnity to

cure anything illegal or unconstitu-tional which it may have done." HER MAJESTY'S INFLUENCE. "In the event of the Queen dying what effect, in your opinion, will her demise have upon international oper-ations? Do you think it will affect the

peace of the world?"
"I think the modern relations of states is not likely to be seriously affected by a change of sovereign, al-though her majesty used her influence as a monarch largely in favor of the maintenance of peace. Her reign is the longest and most successful in the history of England. There have been only a few sovereigns in whose reign great improvements were made in the constitution of England-Edward I. and Henry II. Edward was undoubtedly a very great man, and he exercised great personal influence in bring ing about the changes that were made in the laws of England during his reign. Henry II. did a great deal to establish his supremacy-the supremacy of the law over the church. Queen Victoria has been a most industrious sovereign, considering the great questions of state which have been sub-

mitted for her sanction.

"Mr. Gladstone pointed out in his c'ebrated article to The North American Review, entitled 'Our Kin Belegislative assembly in a colony is youd the Sea,' the important and substantial power that her majesty exercised within the unquestioned limits of her constitutional authority. pointed out that a minister is pressed while in office with the questions that are immediately before him, and he has no time to minutely examine what has been done by his predecessors in respect to matters of a like character. But the sovereign during her whole life is a permanent factor in the government. She can inform her prime minister of what has been done by his predecessors in respect to matters of a like character. She can thus suggest to him the wisdom of comparing the advice which he gives with that which was at an earlier period. given by another, and so afford him the opportunity, if he is so disposed, to reconsider his own conclusion by comparing his own advice with that tendered by some of his predecessors in office. The longer an industrious and patient sovereign is in office the greater becomes her influence, resting upon experience-not by any attempt to substitute her own opinions for those of her minister, but by aiding him, by the sources of information suggested, to revise his conclusions, if he has any doubt in his own mind upon the subject.'


