Mothers of Nine Babies in Three Years.
Pittsburg, Pa., July 16.—Mrs. Geneva Taylor, 38 years old, wife of Hiram Taylor, a poor farmer living at Looney Creek, W. The Death Record.

Vancouver, July 16.—W. A. Gilmour, law partner of Sir Hibbert Tupper and Hon. Fred Peters, died suddenly at Vancouver, B. C., Monday evening, as the result of an attack of convulsions.

Mr. Gilmour was 31 years old. He was married on June 14 to his wife, Miss A. Turner, of Hamilton, Ont.

New York, July 16.—The Rev. Dr. Charles A. Wooley, pastor of the Zion Congregational Church, of Toronto, Ont., was found dead in his room in the Grand Union Hotel yesterday, by his sister, Miss Louisa Wooley, of this city. He had been ill for some time of Bright's disease and his death was due to that malady.

Montreal, Que., July 16.—Thomas Wilson, a retired stock broker and an honorary member of the Montreal Stock Exchange, died suddenly Monday evening, near his summer residence at Pointe Claire. He was attacked with heart failure while in a pleasure boat and fell partly into the water, being dead when assistance reached him.

DEADLY ALLIGATOR DUEL
After a Battle Lasting Two Hours and a Half

The Florida Lurian Was Killed by His Bronx Park Rival.

New York, July 15.—A Florida alligator measuring 8 feet 9 inches from the tip of his tail to the end of his nose arrived at the New York Zoological Park a week ago. He was captured and sent north from Florida. The park people christened him Ike. Until yesterday Ike was kept in a tank by himself and seemed for all the world to be pleased with himself and all around him. Yesterday it was decided to put him in the big pit with an old alligator which has been in the park collection some time, and whose name is Pete. Pete is 9 feet 7 inches over all. Hitherto he has had the pit all to himself and was thought good-natured. But when the new alligator made his appearance yesterday Pete didn't like it a bit. The two alligators looked at one another from different ends of the pit for some time. Finally Pete, diving under water reappeared within a few feet of Ike and opened his enormous jaws so that like could see down his throat. It was a cage of combat, and he accepted it.

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KING'S JOURNEY TO COWES CAUSED HIM NO DISCOMFORT

His Majesty's General Condition Is Excellent.

GRATIFIED WITH THE CHANGE

Enjoyed the Sea Air on the Yacht's Open Deck—Warships Fired Salutes.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 16.—A bulletin issued at 11:29 o'clock this morning, says:

"His majesty bore the journey from London to Cowes extremely well, and suffered no inconvenience in the process of moving."

"The King had a good night. His general condition is excellent. He is much gratified at the change of air and scene."

"His majesty had his couch wheeled out upon the open deck two hours yesterday afternoon."

"Treves, Laking, A. R. Bankhart."

Portsmouth, England, July 15.—The removal of his majesty from

the train to the royal yacht was safely accomplished by bluejackets, and the King's couch was placed in a reception room which had been especially constructed on the upper deck.

The warships in the harbor fired a royal salute as the King embarked, and all the vessels dressed ship and manned yards or decks. The royal yacht steamed off almost immediately after the transfer was completed.

AT COWES.
Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 15.—The royal yacht having on board King Edward, Queen Alexandra and the princesses anchored in Cowes' roads today at 4:20 p.m., after a short cruise eastward.

It was officially stated this evening that the King was not fatigued by the journey, not in the least distressed by the transfers, and that he expressed great pleasure at the change.

LORD DUNDONALD.
Major-General Lord Dundonald, who commanded the second cavalry brigade at the relief of Ladysmith, Natal, sailed today from Liverpool for Montreal on board the steamer Lake Champlain in order to take over the command of the Canadian militia.

Twenty-seven Dead Taken Out—Total Loss Unknown—Powder Magazine Exploded.

Park City, Utah, July 16.—Two powder magazines at the 1,200-foot level of the Daly-West mine exploded about 1 o'clock this morning, causing a loss of life that at present cannot be estimated nor even guessed at.

MANY DEAD TAKEN OUT.
At 4 o'clock 27 men had been taken out of the mine dead, and several others had been recovered in a half-dazed condition. These were all brought out through the Ontario mine shaft, which is a mile distant from the Daly-West, in which the explosion occurred.

The 1,200-foot level of the Daly-West corresponds to and is connected by tunnel with the 600-foot level of the Ontario.

200 TO 250 IN THE MINES.
In the Daly-West mine between 100 and 150 men were at work. In the Ontario were nearly 100, it is believed.

It is not known how many of these are dead, but the disaster extends to the Ontario, as the noxious gases that have been freed are known to be the cause of several deaths. The presence of these gases leads many miners to believe that the powder was burned, and that the explosion was not the chief cause of the disaster.

GREAT MASS OF POWDER.
There are two powder magazines at the 1,200-foot level of the Daly-West, one at each side of the shaft, with a capacity of from one to two cars of powder each. A car of powder was added to the supply within the past few days.

Three men have been taken out of the Ontario shaft. It is believed all were suffocated.

TREMENDOUS FORCE OF SHOCK.
The explosion was so tremendous that it is said that two horses in the ore tunnel, one and a half miles away, were killed by it.

Women and children are thronging to the Ontario shafthouse, which is midway between Park City and the Daly-West. Nearly all of them have husbands or fathers in the mines, and their grief is pitiable.

Members of a relief party who went into the Ontario mine shortly after the explosion occurred have not yet returned, and fears are entertained for their safety.

IN CAMBRIA MINE
Four-Fifths of Those Who Survived Explosion Back at Work.

Johnstown, Pa., July 16.—Probably four-fifths of the men who survived the awful explosion in the Cambria mine returned to work yesterday. No new bodies were found, and none of the victims at the morgue were identified. Business was resumed today, and the only sign of the recent disaster was two funerals from St. Stephen's Church.

Rev. Father Dombinski, pastor of St. Casimir's Polish Catholic Church, says all his missing parishioners have been accounted for, but in several of the churches members are still missing.

began to miss cattle—two or three at a time. We had somewhere about 50 that were branded and it was always the unbranded that were missing. WIFE MISSING.

The stranger was Harry Tracy. Since then I have from time to time heard of him, but have never seen him since."
